1 MR. LAWLOR: Good evening 2 everyone. Thank you for taking the time to join 3 us this evening. I would like to welcome and acknowledge all of the elected officials that 4 5 are in attendance representing Lake County, as well as the Villages of Lake Villa and 6 7 (Whereupon the list was read) Lindenhurst. 8 Will everyone please stand at 9 this time and join me in reciting the Pledge of 10 Allegiance? 11 (Pledge of Allegiance) 12 The time is now 6:00. officially call to order the public hearing for 13 14 the Special Service Area #16 and ask that a roll 15 call be taken for all County Board members 16 present. 17 MR. WALLER: Member Pedersen? 18 MEMBER PEDERSEN: Here. 19 MR. WALLER: Member Hewitt? 20 MEMBER HEWITT: Here. 21 MR. WALLER: Member Weber? 22 MEMBER WEBER: Here. 23 MR. WALLER: Member Carter? 24 MEMBER CARTER: Here.

- 1 established for the purpose of providing
- 2 improvements and extensions to the existing
- 3 water supply system to provide access to Lake
- 4 Michigan water through the existing system of
- 5 the Central Lake County Joint Action Water
- 6 Agency.
- 7 Public notices were mailed to all
- 8 property owners and taxpayers of record for
- 9 parcels within the SSA boundary at the beginning
- 10 of July. All persons desiring to be heard on
- any issue embodied in that notice, including all
- 12 persons owning taxable property located within
- 13 the Special Service Area, will have an
- 14 opportunity to present written or oral testimony
- 15 at this hearing.
- For the purpose of managing the
- 17 comment portion of the hearing, I appoint Daniel
- 18 Jasica, Chief Deputy States Attorney, as the
- 19 parliamentarian. The rules of procedure for
- 20 this hearing are as follows.
- 21 First, any interested person
- 22 wishing to speak at this public hearing shall
- 23 complete and submit to the Chair a completed
- 24 speaking request form. Second, each individual

- 1 may speak only once and shall be limited to 7
- 2 minutes maximum.
- 3 Third, individuals with similar
- 4 interests and concerns are encouraged to
- 5 coordinate their participation at the hearing so
- 6 as to avoid repetitive or redundant statements.
- 7 Fourth, members of the County Board will not be
- 8 addressing specific comments or questions at
- 9 this time. This ensures that all interested
- 10 parties have an opportunity to present oral
- 11 testimony. Representatives from Lake County and
- 12 the Villages of Lake Villa and Lindenhurst are
- 13 happy to answer any questions and will be
- 14 available to do so at the conclusion of this
- 15 hearing.
- 16 The reason for the proposed
- 17 establishment of the Special Service Area is to
- 18 provide special municipal services to all
- 19 property owners within the area reflected by the
- 20 maps and list of PINs identified in the public
- 21 notice and depicted on boards around the room.
- 22 Generally this represents
- 23 properties within the municipal boundaries of
- 24 the Village of Lake Villa, the Village of

- 1 Lindenhurst, and the unincorporated areas served
- 2 by the Grandwood Park and Fox Lake Hills water
- 3 systems.
- 4 The special municipal services
- 5 include improvements and extensions to the
- 6 existing water supply system to provide access
- 7 to Lake Michigan water. This will be achieved
- 8 through connections to the existing water system
- 9 of the Central Lake County Joint Action Water
- 10 Agency, commonly known has CLCJAWA. Special
- 11 service area bonds in an amount not to exceed 46
- 12 million dollars would be issued to pay for the
- 13 special services through ad valorem property
- 14 taxes.
- The Village of Lindenhurst and
- 16 the Village of Lake Villa have each approved a
- 17 resolution of intent to proceed with the Lake
- 18 Michigan Water Project and to participate in the
- 19 establishment of the Special Service Area.
- Lake County and the Villages of
- 21 Lindenhurst and Lake Villa have each held
- 22 numerous public open house meetings to educate
- 23 residents and property owners about this
- 24 project. Different mailings, brochures,

- 1 websites, and automated phone calls were used as
- 2 a means to spread the word about these meetings.
- 3 However, we understand that not
- 4 everyone has attended or may have read the
- 5 information. So to further explain the details
- 6 of the Lake Michigan Water Project and the
- 7 establishment of the Special Service Area, the
- 8 Project Manager, Mr. Bill Balling of WRB, LLC
- 9 will now provide a brief informational
- 10 presentation on the project details.
- MR. BALLING: Thank you, Mr.
- 12 Chairman. Good evening. Bill Balling. What I
- 13 would like to do is address the public hearing
- 14 audience and County Board as well. As the
- 15 Chairman pointed out, this is a quorum of the
- 16 Lake County Board that has been organized here
- 17 this evening and called to order in pursuit of
- 18 the consideration of the establishment of
- 19 Special Service District Number 16 for the
- 20 County. Lake Villa, Lindenhurst, and Lake
- 21 County are partnering to bring Lake Michigan
- 22 water to those villages and Grandwood Park and
- 23 Fox Lake Hills by 2017.
- 24 Independent studies commissioned

- 1 by these agencies have confirmed that converting
- 2 the existing groundwater supply to Lake Michigan
- 3 water will provide the highest quality
- 4 sustainable water supply. The Central Lake
- 5 County Joint Action Water Agency, which I will
- 6 be referring to as CLCJAWA, is a wholesale water
- 7 provider currently serving 9 communities in Lake
- 8 County and has invited the project partners to
- 9 join their system.
- 10 Accepting this invitation will
- 11 allow us to become full agency members and
- 12 facilitate the purchase of our full water supply
- 13 needs from them. Let me talk a little bit about
- 14 the overall conclusions of our study. All of
- 15 the water systems are experiencing similar water
- 16 quality and quantity challenges reflected
- 17 through independent reports, customer feedback,
- 18 and our own observations.
- 19 Our communities have studied
- 20 expanding the use of both the shallow and the
- 21 deep aquifers for future water supply. Although
- 22 the level of concern varies by community, both
- 23 shallow and deep aquifers carry supply and
- 24 quality risks. Simply put, the current water

- 1 demands -- current water systems cannot meet
- 2 either current or future water demands for these
- 3 areas.
- 4 Pursuing Lake Michigan water to
- 5 replace our current groundwater supply is the
- 6 most cost effective, long-term option when
- 7 considering both water supply and water quality.
- 8 An analysis of the current water well systems
- 9 indicates improvements are necessary to meet our
- 10 current and future needs. The expense to
- 11 improve our groundwater well system would
- 12 actually be more than pursuing Lake Michigan
- 13 water supply options.
- 14 Lake Michigan water is a very
- 15 high quality natural water source -- supply and
- 16 is sustainable for the long-term. Hundreds of
- 17 metropolitan Chicago communities have converted
- 18 their groundwater supply to lake water since the
- 19 early 1980s and have realized the benefits of
- 20 Lake Michigan water.
- 21 Some of those benefits are listed
- 22 on this slide here. Lake County and the
- 23 Villages of Lindenhurst and Lake Villa have an
- 24 allocation they received from the State of

- 1 Illinois to draw water from Lake Michigan and
- 2 now we are focused on how do we deliver that
- 3 water system in the most economic and efficient
- 4 matter.
- 5 This is Special Service Area 16.
- 6 I should point out that most of you have seen
- 7 our boards on the side and they will be
- 8 available throughout the evening. In order to
- 9 proceed with the Lake Michigan water project and
- 10 extend the CLCJAWA water transmission lines to
- 11 each community, Special Service Area Number 16
- 12 is essential and needs to be established.
- The map which shows the
- 14 properties in color are the areas within the SSA
- 15 area. And again, you can -- they are available
- 16 throughout this hearing to take a closer look at
- 17 the specifics. In terms of cost impacts, there
- 18 are 2 important financing elements being pursued
- 19 to minimize the cost impact on the property
- 20 owners.
- 21 The first is to phase the
- 22 financing, as many of the residents have
- 23 mentioned to us, so that the full tax impact of
- 24 the project can be deferred as long as possible

- 1 until construction begins. This table then
- 2 demonstrates the phased structure of the
- 3 financing in the early years.
- 4 The second financing element
- 5 which we wish to pursue is an Illinois
- 6 Environmental Protection Agency low interest
- 7 loan for the actual construction work through
- 8 CLCJAWA. IEPA 20 year loans are priced less
- 9 than half of the current market rates and are
- 10 reserved for priority infrastructure in the
- 11 State for which this project qualifies. If the
- 12 financing were improved today, the IEPA loan
- 13 rate for a 20 year loan would be 1.93 percent.
- 14 A portion of the cost of
- 15 this project will come from the SSA real estate
- 16 tax component which is based on property value.
- 17 This type of financing is the most appropriate
- 18 cost effective means to fund a capital project
- 19 of this magnitude. The other portion of the
- 20 project's cost is the water rate component that
- 21 will be in effect once the water is delivered.
- This expense covers the
- 23 purchase of water from CLCJAWA. The table on
- 24 this slide shows and represents those costs. By

- 1 illustration, if the SSA were approved, you
- 2 would see a line item on your property tax bill
- 3 for the Lake County Special Service Area Number
- 4 16.
- 5 In addition, you will also
- 6 see a line for a CLCJAWA tax of \$30 per year
- 7 which expires in 2018. What this means is that
- 8 for a property, for a \$200,000 market value
- 9 home, consuming an average 6000 gallons per
- 10 month, a property owner would pay approximately
- 11 \$21 more in taxes and \$16.56 more in water
- 12 charges per month. That roughly is equivalent
- 13 to a bottle of water purchase on a daily basis
- 14 or about \$40 a month.
- The actual monthly utility bill
- 16 for Lake Michigan water including sewer service
- 17 should be about \$65. Now, that number will vary
- 18 slightly from community to community and does
- 19 not reflect the property tax component. But we
- 20 have found that slide to be very beneficial in
- 21 people understanding the context and impact of
- 22 receiving this water.
- 23 Let me speak for a minute on
- 24 the benefits of CLCJAWA membership. CLCJAWA

- 1 produces a very high quality Lake Michigan water
- 2 within the State and has done so with a 100
- 3 percent performance track record for over 20
- 4 years.
- 5 Since we will be connecting to
- 6 their existing system, the benefits of the
- 7 current treatment plant located in Lake Bluff
- 8 and the transmission lines that are located
- 9 throughout Central Lake County greatly reduces
- 10 the construction cost when compared to building
- 11 an entirely new system for our members.
- 12 Our collaborative
- 13 arrangement with CLCJAWA also eliminates any
- 14 unnecessary duplication of facilities, which is
- 15 a good government practice. CLCJAWA has agreed
- 16 to pursue and has applied for the low interest
- 17 IEPA capital funding for this project.
- Now, this slide shows the
- 19 conceptual supply map. Shown in blue is the
- 20 extension of the CLCJAWA system to service our
- 21 area. Notice that each community water system
- 22 will have its own connection point to the new
- 23 transmission lines. The specific routing for
- 24 the new pipes will be one of the first

- 1 engineering design tasks undertaken once the SSA
- 2 is approved.
- 3 The anticipated project
- 4 schedule shown on this slide is both focused and
- 5 aggressive as we seek to deliver Lake Michigan
- 6 water to you by 2017. Our focus in 2013 will be
- 7 the establishment of the SSA District, the first
- 8 phase of financing to begin the engineering
- 9 design, and completion of financing and
- 10 authorization of a design contract for that
- 11 purpose.
- 12 2014 will actually be a year
- 13 that will focus on route selection and final
- 14 engineering. 2015 marks the start of the
- 15 physical construction of the project which will
- 16 be wrapped up in 2017. So for 2013, our steps
- 17 here that we need to take is of course the
- importance of this public hearing here tonight,
- 19 receiving your comments, and have the County
- 20 Board evaluating those comments.
- Then the County Board will be
- 22 considering the establishment of the ordinance
- 23 of the SSA 16 on November 12, 2013. Also later
- 24 in November, the first SSA bonds will be issued

- 1 to support the engineering design also in
- 2 November of 2013. Then the CLCJAWA engineering
- 3 contract we expect to be authorized in December
- 4 of 2013 for the physical design of the system.
- 5 Thank you very much for your time
- 6 this evening. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
- 7 MR. LAWLOR: All right. Just a
- 8 couple more things before we get to your
- 9 comments. I would much rather hear from you
- 10 then be talking all this time. I would like to
- 11 open the floor to any County Board members who
- 12 have comments. Any Board members who would like
- 13 to make a comment?
- MR. WEBER: I would just like to
- 15 thank everybody for coming out tonight. I
- 16 really haven't? Received any emails. It will
- 17 be much easier for us to make decisions on this
- 18 being able to hear your comments.
- 19 MR. LAWLOR: Okay. All right.
- 20 It doesn't seem that we have any other -- are
- 21 there any other comments from Board members?
- 22 Member Pedersen?
- MS. PEDERSEN: I appreciate all
- 24 of you coming out this evening, taking the time

- 1 to come out and get as much information as you
- 2 possible can. Please know that all of us
- 3 sitting up here will listen diligently to your
- 4 comments and what you have to say. Thank you
- 5 very much for coming out this evening.
- 6 MR. LAWLOR: Hopefully the mic
- 7 cooperates. With no other comments from Board
- 8 members, I would like to reiterate for the
- 9 public that no such Special Service Area or
- 10 bonds may be issued if a petition objecting to
- 11 the creation of the area or the issuance of the
- 12 bonds for the provision of the Special Service
- 13 Area is signed by at least 51 percent of
- 14 electors residing within the area, and by at
- 15 least 51 percent of the owners of record of the
- 16 land included within the boundaries of the area
- 17 as filed with the County Clerk within 60 days
- 18 following the final adjournment of this hearing.
- 19 Any written comments
- 20 submitted to the Clerk's office prior to the
- 21 hearing or submitted at this hearing will be
- 22 sent to all Board members and be available at
- 23 the County Clerk's office for public viewing.
- Prior to today's hearing, I

- 1 recognized receipt of written comments from the
- 2 following individuals. Mr. Mike Tulley with the
- 3 Forest Preserve. He states as discussed, please
- 4 remove the above referenced PIN from SSA 16 as
- 5 it was included in error. Thank you for your
- 6 attention to this matter. Mike Tulley
- We also received written comment
- 8 from Helga Veem (phonetic) She states my name is
- 9 Helga Veem. I live in unincorporated Lake
- 10 Villa. It states her address. I have a well,
- 11 and I'm not connected to any municipal water
- 12 supply. How will this proposal affect me if
- 13 passed? Do I have to have my home connected to
- 14 the Village water supply? Who is going to pay
- 15 for it? My home is 350 to 400 feet from the
- 16 road. Or am I exempt from having to
- 17 participate? Please respond.
- That is the conclusion of
- 19 all written comments received. Everyone who is
- 20 intending to speak at this event, at this time
- 21 if you could stand and raise your right hand so
- 22 you could be sworn in.
- 23 (Public sworn)
- MR. LAWLOR: Thank you very much.

- 1 At this time I would like to open the floor for
- 2 oral testimony or any public comment concerning
- 3 the establishment of the Special Service Area
- 4 and the issuance of the SSA bonds from the
- 5 public.
- I also ask that everyone
- 7 please abide by the rules set forth earlier in
- 8 this meeting. Our parliamentarian will enforce
- 9 these rules in an effort to make the process
- 10 proceed in a timely fashion and as fairly as
- 11 possible to hear from all of our commenters here
- 12 tonight.
- MR. JASICA: The first 3 speakers
- 14 are Tom Girardi, Ernie Masucci, and Fred
- 15 Natschke. I would ask that you come on up,
- 16 especially the first person, but the other
- 17 people who are second and third be ready to go
- 18 so that we don't waste any time. And 7 minutes
- 19 per commenter.
- 20 So Mr. Girardi?
- MR. GIRARDI: No comment.
- MR. JASICA: Okay. No comment
- 23 from Mr. Girardi. Ernie Masucci?
- MR. MASUCCI: Good evening. I

- 1 will be brief. We are in unincorporated Lake
- 2 County a little bit to the east of Grandwood
- 3 Park. We would like to know who to contact or
- 4 who we could possibly contact and if we could
- 5 participate in this also.
- 6 We were wondering about the
- 7 size of the pipes and whether it will be able to
- 8 accommodate any of our homes. And what the
- 9 process would be, if we could participate with
- 10 our subdivision also possibly, or at least be in
- 11 the conversation. That's it.
- 12 MR. JASICA: Fred Natschke and
- 13 Bill Wood and Bill Maxwell?
- MR. NATSCHKE: My name is Fred
- 15 Natschke. I live in Lake Villa. The main
- 16 concern I'm against the Lake Michigan water just
- 17 because right now our taxes are becoming
- 18 impossible for us to sustain. My actual taxes
- 19 cost more than my mortgage.
- I love living in Lake
- 21 County. I mean I work for the State of
- 22 Illinois. But the fact is I can't afford to
- 23 live in the State of Illinois. I mean we are
- 24 the highest tax up here. And it is just -- it

- 1 is money is what it is. It is costing us just
- 2 too much. You know, my property taxes are
- 3 through the roof. My property taxes cost more
- 4 than my mortgage.
- 5 That to me is -- you know,
- 6 for a young guy trying to make it, it is an
- 7 impossibility. I know what the paperwork says
- 8 here will always be different than what you
- 9 actually get. I mean you are going by what a
- 10 contractor or whoever else, you know -- there is
- 11 no guarantee. There is always delays. I know
- 12 because I deal with it every day. But it is
- 13 just -- it is not an affordability. I thank you
- 14 for allowing me to speak.
- MR. JASICA: Bill Wood?
- MR. WOOD: Hi. I have a problem
- 17 with the honesty of politicians nowadays. So I
- 18 was very disappointed when back here I see
- 19 pictures of Cedar Lake. One in 2011, one in
- 20 2012. One has low levels, one has high levels.
- 21 I'm disappointed there wasn't a picture of 2013
- 22 because it was at its highest level it has been
- in 5 years in the Spring of 2013.
- 24 So I think I feel there is a

- 1 little bit of deception here giving people who
- 2 don't know better information that really in my
- 3 opinion is not right. How do I know? I fish
- 4 Cedar Lake. I know what the levels are all the
- 5 time.
- Another thing I would like to say
- 7 is -- and by the way, I'm not necessarily
- 8 against this thing. But there is a bike path
- 9 going underneath -- I think it is still under
- 10 construction, underneath Highway 132. It is a
- 11 very big ordeal. Some of the lanes were closed
- 12 down.
- 13 I would rather see tax
- 14 dollars going to something like this other than
- 15 to something like a bike path going underneath
- 16 Highway 132. One last thing is the 51 percent
- 17 thing, and 51 percent of the homeowners to -- if
- 18 we can get a petition with 51 percent of those
- 19 people agreeing that this shouldn't happen, why
- 20 not do a referendum instead?
- 21 I think that it would be
- 22 extremely difficult, almost impossible in 60
- 23 days to get those signatures. So I think it is
- 24 not a great way to do it. If you really want to

- 1 know what the people in this area think, do a
- 2 referendum. You might see that there is not
- 3 enough time for that, but we have known this
- 4 problem has been here for quite a while.
- 5 I know that this has been
- 6 measured in years now because some years ago I
- 7 got a letter in the mail about radium in the
- 8 water. People were talking about getting water
- 9 from a different source then.
- 10 So I'm kind of disappointed
- 11 that this isn't a referendum instead of this
- 12 petition stuff. So thank you very much.
- MR. JASICA: Bill Maxwell, and
- 14 Mike DeRossi, and Anita Fritzlek?
- MR. MAXWELL: Good evening.
- 16 Thanks for the opportunity. I'm probably not
- 17 real happy with a lot of things that go on in
- 18 politics either. Not happy about my tax rates.
- 19 In fact some of the things that go on scare me a
- 20 little bit. But probably one of the things that
- 21 scares me more is perhaps trying to sell my
- 22 house in 5 years and 15 years and not having
- 23 Lake Michigan water.
- 24 I figured some applause

- 1 would stop on that one. We all lost lots of
- 2 money in the downturn of 2007, 2008. Some of it
- 3 has come back for many people. What we have
- 4 lost that hasn't come back is our housing
- 5 values. I am very concerned about being in an
- 6 area where I compete with houses to sell on the
- 7 other side of Grand Avenue that have a real leg
- 8 up on me from a housing standpoint, and those
- 9 are people in Gurnee and Grayslake who already
- 10 have the advantage of Lake Michigan water.
- I am very much concerned
- 12 about what it will do long-term. I don't want
- 13 to pay the taxes. I would like to see some
- 14 taxes come from other places, but I don't think
- 15 this is something that we can stop. That's my
- 16 opinion. Thank you.
- MR. JASICA: Mike DeRossi?
- 18 Nobody? Anita Fritzlek and Robert Frank and
- 19 Karen Proper?
- 20 MS. FRITZLEK: I have just a
- 21 couple of questions, and I would like to say
- 22 while I appreciate the lovely boards in the back
- 23 and some of the mail I got, I really would
- 24 respectfully like to request that instead of, I

- 1 don't know, the bulk of what I have here in my
- 2 mailing is the ongoing saga of the description
- 3 of exactly where this is going to go. What I
- 4 would like to see is some paperwork of this size
- 5 that is what you presented and flipped through
- 6 really, really quickly tonight.
- 7 I appreciate you respecting
- 8 our time, you know. I know you want to get
- 9 through this real quickly. But I need -- maybe
- 10 I'm a slow learner. I need more time to look at
- 11 those things that you had on your power point
- 12 and really digest it to understand what we are
- 13 getting into.
- I am in favor of another
- 15 source of water. It is obvious what is
- 16 happening here is happening in many states
- 17 across the United States. The reality is we do
- 18 need another source of water. So I'm not
- 19 totally against it, but we want to know what we
- 20 are getting into. How long are we going to be
- 21 having the tax increase monthly?
- That slide went by faster
- 23 than I could take it in. So I would really like
- 24 to have some handouts or another mailing that

- 1 doesn't have so much filler and more content.
- 2 Then I'm a little confused, and this is just my
- 3 own deficit I guess, but I have heard, and this
- 4 is what happens when you just hear, that this is
- 5 going to -- we are going to tie into Lake
- 6 Forest. And now I'm hearing we are tying into
- 7 Lake Bluff. So that's a question right there.
- 8 What I would like to know is
- 9 they warn us against eating the fish from Lake
- 10 Michigan because of the elevated mercury levels.
- 11 If we are going to tie into Lake Forest, if we
- 12 are going to tie into Lake Bluff, I would like
- 13 to know what their mercury levels are, if they
- 14 are getting their water from Lake Michigan.
- 15 What will our mercury levels be? Thank you.
- MR. JASICA: Robert Frank, Karen
- 17 Proper, and Terren Robb?
- MR. FRANK: Good evening. I
- 19 don't like taxes either. I think that's kind of
- 20 a slam dunk for everybody. I don't want my
- 21 water bill to be higher than my mortgage. I
- 22 have lived in this town since 1982. I have
- 23 known about the problem for many, many years
- 24 here. I have been explained how our deep wells

- 1 are mixing with our shallow wells. Our shallow
- 2 wells are running dry.
- 3 My concern goes back to 20
- 4 years back, and Pat Carey can attest to this, I
- 5 had approached JAWA to see if Lake Villa could
- 6 jump onto the bandwagon once JAWA got
- 7 established. At that time we were told not a
- 8 chance. At that time we were told a huge
- 9 number, and it is 18 some odd years ago. It was
- 10 going to be 80 plus million dollars. There was
- 11 no way Lake Villa could do that at that time.
- 12 We looked at our well
- 13 situation. Lake Villa felt hey, we can mix our
- 14 shallow well water with our deep well water and
- 15 make it work. Unfortunately our aquifer is
- 16 dropping to the point now -- and I'm no expert.
- 17 I'm no engineer. But I have got to believe that
- 18 this is accurate information. My concern is if
- 19 we don't pursue the Lake Michigan water, if we
- 20 do run dry, what is going to be our alternative?
- You talk about real estate
- 22 values. I'm involved in real estate. I know I
- 23 can't sell real estate without water. People in
- 24 Texas are going to learn that very soon. This

- 1 is a body of water that we can tap. We get this
- 2 allocation once I believe. I don't think we can
- 3 come back and tap it again. Without Lake
- 4 Michigan water, we will have a definite impact
- 5 on our real estate values.
- I do support this work that
- 7 CLCJAWA is doing right now in allowing Lake
- 8 Villa, Lindenhurst, Fox Lake Hills, Grandwood
- 9 Park to tie to this water system because this is
- 10 a long-term solution. Unfortunately it would be
- 11 very shortsighted to deal with the shallow wells
- 12 and mixing with deep well water that has radium
- 13 impacting it right now.
- I'm in support of it. I
- 15 would like to try to persuade some other people
- 16 to be in support of it. I don't like paying for
- 17 it, but I don't think we have much of a choice.
- 18 Thanks for letting me speak.
- 19 MR. JASICA: Karen Proper, Terren
- 20 Robb, and Marietta Litke?
- MS. PROPER: Karen Proper. My
- 22 question is first when will these answers be
- 23 answered and where will they be given?
- MR. LAWLOR: Thank you. I had a

- 1 couple questions from my Board, and I was
- 2 actually going to break in. People will be
- 3 responded to individually, but we are also going
- 4 to be sharing the questions and answers on our
- 5 website.
- It is also a good idea if
- 7 you signed in, if you didn't give us your email,
- 8 it will be great to have your email address so
- 9 we can make sure we get the information directly
- 10 to you.
- MS. PROPER: Perfect. My other
- 12 question is regarding the water supply. When
- 13 all of the new subdivisions were being built,
- 14 was there a water supply study done prior to
- 15 that, prior to the approval to build the
- 16 subdivision Stranton Oaks, the Shires, and all
- 17 the other new ones that would fall within the
- 18 Grandwood well district?
- And if that study was done,
- 20 is it available for public view? And why wasn't
- 21 some of the infrastructure cost for all of this
- 22 water, knowing that this day was coming, why
- 23 wasn't some of, that passed on to the
- 24 developers?

- 1 Also, are there other
- 2 alternatives, sources to fund this because in
- 3 Stranton Oaks on my tax bill, I already pay an
- 4 SSA, NLFPA #9 at \$330.52 a year before any of my
- 5 other taxes. So to pay another SSA on top of
- 6 all the other normal taxes that continue to go
- 7 up, it is going to price us right out of the
- 8 State.
- 9 MR. JASICA: Terren Robb,
- 10 Marietta Litke, Dan Tybon?
- 11 MS. LITKE: I'm Marietta Litke.
- 12 Good evening. I think we have all read a lot of
- 13 newspaper articles that call into question there
- 14 is just too many variances. I read one article
- where a \$200,000 home, an assessed value, which
- 16 is so much different than market value, would be
- 17 \$516 in additional taxes.
- 18 I'm not really thrilled
- 19 about Lake Michigan's water. I think Deerfield
- 20 just came in to getting Lake Michigan water, and
- 21 this week they had a boiling alert. They are
- 22 always closing beaches in Chicago because of
- 23 various bacteria count.
- 24 Also I understand that Lake

- 1 Villa has plenty of deep water, and the shallow
- 2 wells are dependent upon rainfall. We had an
- 3 abundant amount of that this year. It's the
- 4 other areas such as Lindenhurst that have no
- 5 deep water wells.
- I see on the written thing
- 7 that there is a possible second levy of taxes
- 8 should more money be coming into play. Quite
- 9 frankly, it is just an absence of any interstate
- 10 northwest highway, which we never had. You
- 11 can't get anywhere out in Lake County unless you
- 12 go to the highway.
- This is just very, very
- 14 expensive for a lot of people. Now, will this
- 15 275 per gallon of water have sewage assessed to
- it as well, because the sewage rate is sky high.
- 17 I guess that's it. Thank you.
- 18 MR. JASICA: Dan Tybon, Marc
- 19 Lilteureux, and Mike Butler? And please when
- 20 you start, please state your name so the court
- 21 reporter can get it.
- MR. TYBON: Hi. My name is Dan
- 23 Tybon. I'm not against this, but I'm not sure
- 24 the funding is being done properly. I don't

- 1 feel taxation is the way to do it. We have not
- 2 had a vote. I think the gentleman mentioned a
- 3 referendum. I think it would be by far the
- 4 better way of doing this rather than just
- 5 sticking this on our taxes.
- As many people have said,
- 7 our tax are already beyond what we can stand.
- 8 And this is not the way to do it. I think there
- 9 is other referendums, general obligation bonds,
- 10 or something else. But taxing us again on
- 11 something that is -- Lake County water supply
- 12 should have been planning this far longer than
- 13 just in the immediate day.
- 14 Years and years ago it
- 15 should have been looked at. Not just a bond
- 16 referendum that came up all of a sudden and is
- 17 being tacked on to our taxes. My second comment
- 18 is I'm not sure the way they are taxing it is
- 19 proper. They are looking at doing it as an
- 20 assessed value instead of just a hookup fee.
- 21 Sewage and everything else comes at a hookup fee
- 22 which is a standard for all homeowners in the
- 23 area.
- 24 This is being assessed at

- 1 your value. If your value goes up, you have
- 2 taken care of your house, and it is valued a
- 3 little bit more than your neighbors, you are
- 4 paying more for the same water than your
- 5 neighbors are paying for. That's my comment.
- 6 MR. JASICA: Marc Lilteureux,
- 7 Mike Butler, and Paul Schmidt? Please state
- 8 your name.
- 9 MR. LILTEUREUX: Hello. I'm Marc
- 10 Lilteureux. On the SSA loan itself, it is on my
- 11 property taxes. What happens to the loan when I
- 12 try to sell my house? Am I responsible solely
- on my portion of the loan when I try to sell the
- 14 house? Is it transferrable to the new
- 15 homeowner? What are the legal implications of
- 16 the SSA loan that affects the values of the
- 17 property? Thank you.
- MR. JASICA: Mike Butler, Paul
- 19 Schmidt, and Mark Kerpon?
- MR. BUTLER: I am Mike Butler. I
- 21 recognize that we need another resource for
- 22 water. Just to clarify, Lake Michigan is not an
- 23 endless supply. I have seen a lot of comments
- 24 about, you know, Lake Michigan water is, you

- 1 know, an indefinite resource. It is not. With
- 2 the interest rates increasing, if this does
- 3 continue, is there an opportunity to have the
- 4 bonds issued earlier?
- 5 What I mean by that is not
- 6 doing it in 2 phases so we can take advantage of
- 7 the low interest rates that are available now
- 8 rather than waiting a couple years, because
- 9 obviously we have an interest to make this as
- 10 inexpensive as possible for all the taxpayers.
- 11 The other thing, I am
- 12 interested in receiving the slides. I don't
- 13 know if those are available to be emailed out to
- 14 those that provided the email address. But I
- 15 believe there is a comment that our allocation,
- 16 in order to take that, that we have to be in
- 17 operation by 2016. Was that a fair statement
- 18 based on the slides?
- 19 If it was, the project plan
- 20 that we have, we will not get water until 2017
- 21 or '18 so what does that mean? Do we not get
- 22 our allocation? I am hearing conflicting
- 23 information based on slides that were presented
- 24 and the FAQ's. Thank you.

- 1 MR. JASICA: Paul Schmidt, Mark
- 2 Kerpon, and Fred Cashmore?
- 3 MR. SCHMIDT: Hello. My name is
- 4 Paul Schmidt. I live in the old part of
- 5 Lindenhurst, just a couple blocks north of the
- 6 Eagle and True Value. You know where the area
- 7 is. I am not on a city hookup. I'm on a
- 8 private well. I always thought this was a great
- 9 thing until I burned out 2 well pumps due to the
- 10 water dropping below the bottom of the well.
- I have had the well company
- 12 come out. They have gone down as deep as they
- 13 can without going to a deep well, which would be
- 14 phenomenally expensive. Other people on my
- 15 street have had the same issue. It's not just
- 16 the street. I have had many long conversations
- 17 with the Village Engineer in Lindenhurst, and
- 18 this is not a new issue.
- I know it is new to some
- 20 people, but I have been following this for
- 21 years. It is a great concern to me and many
- 22 other people who have seen their water cut off.
- 23 If you think something is expensive, wait until
- you can't sell your house, and you have to buy

- 1 your water at the Jewel in gallon jugs. That's
- 2 all I have to say. Thank you.
- 3 MR. JASICA: Mark Kerpon, Fred
- 4 Cashmore, and then Joan Nicolay?
- 5 MR. KERPON: Mark Kerpon. I
- 6 would like to voice my concern that Lake
- 7 Michigan water isn't an endless supply. I think
- 8 the term that was used in the presentation
- 9 information was that it is a long-term
- 10 sustainable water source.
- 11 You know, I'm in a quality
- 12 organization where I work, and we can't use
- 13 obtuse words like long-term. To me long-term
- 14 doesn't mean very much. I am wondering what
- 15 long-term means. I'm also very concerned about
- 16 an environmental standpoint that as more and
- more communities continue to go onto the Lake
- 18 Michigan water source, there will be some burden
- 19 on that source. We can't neglect that today for
- 20 something that could happen in the future.
- 21 I'm also concerned about the
- 22 delivery. I didn't see anything in the
- 23 information about -- I saw for the first time
- 24 here some pipe sizing. But as you continue to

- 1 come off that main feedline and go further and
- 2 further out to your homes, water flow and water
- 3 pressure is going to be impacted.
- I am not sure I have seen
- 5 anything about what the predicted engineering
- 6 specs are for that water flow and water pressure
- 7 to be when it reaches my faucet. Right now I
- 8 have no concerns about that. But I hate to have
- 9 that be something worse than I might have now.
- I think that's all the concerns I
- 11 have. Thank you.
- MR. JASICA: Fred Cashmore, Joan
- 13 Nicolay, Sam Verga?
- MR. CASHMORE: How are you doing
- 15 tonight? Fred Cashmore. I don't read
- 16 newspapers. I don't have time to. My wife and
- 17 I are just making ends meet now with our taxes.
- 18 We have trustees and stuff just living down the
- 19 street. No one has ever came through and said
- 20 hey, our wells are running dry or anything like
- 21 that.
- 22 You know, I worked
- 23 construction for a few years, and you know, I
- 24 put in the station down there at Lake Bluff. It

- 1 was exciting, but I don't think Lake Michigan
- 2 water is our answer. I think our water is good
- 3 in Lake Villa. Nobody has ever said nothing
- 4 otherwise.
- 5 I agree with Fred Natschke
- 6 that you guys are taxing us right out of our
- 7 houses. We are one of the highest tax rates in
- 8 Lake County that I know of. So with that, if
- 9 anybody has got something else to say about it,
- 10 I would really appreciate somebody's feedback to
- 11 it. Thank you.
- MR. JASICA: Joan Nicolay, Sam
- 13 Verga and Dominic Scardina?
- MS. NICOLAY: I'm Joan Nicolay.
- 15 I thought we lived in a Democracy. I really
- 16 think something this important, this big, that
- 17 is basically a lot of people here are on a fixed
- 18 income. We are on a fixed income. We are
- 19 retired. I'm a retired teacher. Right now I'm
- 20 at the point in Illinois I can lose my pension.
- I don't want to go on food
- 22 stamps, but I may be one that you are looking at
- 23 at the store. I think this needs to be put to a
- 24 referendum to the people. I'm sorry to the

- 1 gentleman that said the other side of the
- 2 tracks. My folks just passed away 3 and 4 years
- 3 ago. I was the trustee. I took care of their
- 4 home. They lived in Gurnee. They have Lake
- 5 Michigan water. I had no one ask me about their
- 6 water supply. No realtor did.
- 7 They have 1000 feet bigger
- 8 home than I have. I have 19, they had 29, and
- 9 their taxes were \$2000 less. I had the
- 10 homestead exemption. I have the senior
- 11 exemption, or my husband and I do, and so did my
- 12 folks. You know, Mr. Jeffrey Lee, I don't know
- if he is here, but my house assessment keeps
- 14 going up. My taxes, he just moves the
- 15 multiplier up, up, up.
- 16 I'm paying \$300 more this
- 17 year. My house went down \$3000 worth in value.
- 18 I think we need referendums on this. Lake
- 19 Michigan water is not what it is made out to be.
- 20 There is a lot of problems there. I have family
- 21 in Lake Bluff, Gurnee. They also have their
- 22 problems.
- I do think it should be put
- 24 to a referendum. 60 days -- to get a petition

- 1 out in 60 days, I have a hard time walking to
- 2 begin with. How can I go get all the
- 3 signatures? 51 percent of the village? Does
- 4 that mean just Lake Villa? If the petition is
- 5 signed, do I just get Lake Villa people or does
- 6 it have to be 51 percent of the entire area?
- 7 That's unbelievable in 60 days. How can it be
- 8 done? Thank you.
- 9 MR. JASICA: Sam Verga, Dominic
- 10 Scardina, and Rick Broquet?
- MR. VERGA: No comment.
- MR. SCARDINA: Dominic Scardina.
- 13 Hello everybody. A lot of you people know me
- 14 from church. But I have a few questions about
- 15 this whole thing. One is we got I think over
- 16 40,000 foreclosures in Lake County right now.
- 17 Are them people going to be taxed at \$40 a
- 18 month?
- 19 Another question is why do
- 20 we have to keep raising our taxes and raising
- 21 our taxes and raising our taxes? We all talk
- 22 about raising taxes. Where is it going to stop?
- 23 Number 2, the mailer that was sent out, I'm a
- 24 professional mailer. Susan Lahr knows that.

- 1 Why was that mailer sent out? At what rate?
- 2 First class postage?
- 3 How many people received that
- 4 mailer? I think to me it was a waste of money,
- 5 even though I'm a professional mailer. There
- 6 should have been an article in the paper with a
- 7 list of the index of all the property owners.
- 8 How much was spent on that? I don't know, but
- 9 I'm sure it was about \$2.50 a package. How many
- 10 packets were mailed out? I don't know, 40,000?
- 11 A lot of money wasted by the County Board.
- 12 Thank you.
- 13 MR. JASICA: Rick Broquet, Terry
- 14 Garrett?
- MR. BROQUET: My name is Rick
- 16 Broquet. Couple of things I tend to like to
- 17 agree with is the statements I have heard here
- 18 from Dan and Mike saying that Lake Michigan and
- 19 the long term sustainability, I do question that
- 20 as well. It is at its lowest level it has been
- 21 in probably about 10 or 15 years.
- 22 If you have any doubt, go
- 23 down to the Waukegan harbor. You can see how
- 24 far it is from the pier down to the boat. That

- 1 is a significant drop of water for that large
- 2 body of water. That's an issue.
- I also agree with the issue
- 4 that happened here in Deerfield with the fecal
- 5 matter that was found. They had a boiling
- 6 order. Lake Michigan isn't the total solution I
- 7 would think. However, my real objection is the
- 8 financing of this bond. I'm not particularly
- 9 found of the SSA financing.
- Specifically when you look
- 11 at the terms that you are looking at for
- 12 financing, in the issue that you guys sent out,
- 13 it said the bonds are going to have rates not
- 14 exceeding 7 percent per annum or 125 percent of
- 15 the rate of the most recent date shown in the 20
- 16 year geo bonds index for the average municipal
- 17 bond yields. So you specified the exact finance
- 18 for which you are going to borrow.
- The second paragraph says
- 20 that we the homeowners are going to retire the
- 21 bonds by levies or levies of direct annual taxes
- 22 on properties subject to taxation for the
- 23 services located within the area sufficient to
- 24 pay the interest on the bonds as they become

- 1 due.
- 2 Nothing about principal.
- 3 Nothing about interest or principal. And to
- 4 discharge the principal at maturity. So is this
- 5 a balloon payment? I'm not fond of balloon
- 6 payments. I would rather see it amortized over
- 7 the entire period of time. Balloon payments are
- 8 a dangerous precedent.
- 9 Then it says said direct annual
- 10 taxes shall be levied upon taxable property
- 11 within the area for the entire period that the
- 12 bonds or refund bonds shall be outstanding and
- 13 shall be unlimited as to the rate or amount in
- 14 addition to other taxes. I'm not sure what I
- 15 understand is unlimited. Unlimited scares the
- 16 hell out of me.
- 17 If I'm going to pay for
- 18 something, I want to get my capital costs, and I
- 19 want to make sure I can pay that off in a
- 20 reasonable period of time. I have done that
- 21 with my house. I expect the government to do
- 22 the same thing. What I don't care for is I
- 23 don't care for this unlimited access to my
- 24 wallet. That's unacceptable.

- 1 There were a couple of
- 2 proposals. Dan Tybon, sorry if I'm
- 3 mispronouncing your name. He says he was
- 4 against the financing. He offered some other
- 5 possible solutions like a general obligation
- 6 bond.
- 7 I like what you have here in
- 8 your frequently asked question where it says
- 9 special assessment. A special assessment makes
- 10 a lot more sense to me, where we as the
- 11 homeowners have the opportunity if we want to to
- 12 take care of our obligation to this issue as
- 13 quickly as we possible can, or we can leave it
- 14 stay for the entire period of time.
- 15 So I would like to see the
- 16 financing -- I would really like to see the
- 17 financing fixed, known, and any cost overruns is
- 18 on the contractor, not on the County. Anyhow,
- 19 that is that issue. Last is another piece that
- 20 was brought up that, I forgot who it was, anyhow
- 21 it was an interest rate risk.
- 22 Right now we have some low
- 23 interest rates. Extremely low. Interest rate
- 24 risk is a strong concern of mine. We can get --

- 1 we have never seen interest rates this low ever.
- 2 Why not go ahead and say let's take the money
- 3 out, and if you don't spend it, that's fine, but
- 4 you go ahead and put it into some sort of other
- 5 form of cash account while you go ahead and you
- 6 collect the total amount for all of it,
- 7 engineering costs as well as your capital bill
- 8 costs. Put that all together and pay off the
- 9 loan over that 30 year period of time.
- I just -- the interest rate
- 11 risks scare the hell out of me because I went
- 12 through the 70's and 80's where I saw interest
- 13 rates go from 7 and a half percent for a
- 14 mortgage in mid '70s, '76, to when I went to buy
- 15 my house here in Lindenhurst in 1982 I paid 12
- 16 and a half percent for a mortgage on my house.
- 17 12 and a half percent for a mortgage. That's
- 18 huge.
- 19 People would just freak out
- 20 right now. They are complaining like heck if it
- 21 goes over 4 percent. I would rather see if you
- 22 are going to do this project get it at the
- 23 interest rates right now before 2016 because I'm
- 24 actually betting that the interest rates are

- 1 going to get up to 12, 14 percent some time in
- 2 the late decade here because of the
- 3 irresponsible spenders in Washington. That's my
- 4 opinion. I really would like to see better
- 5 financing. Thank you.
- 6 MR. JASICA: Terry Garrett,
- 7 Robert Johnson, and Karol Threadgill?
- 8 MR. GARRETT: Hello. My name is
- 9 Terry Garrett. I have been a resident of Lake
- 10 Villa for just a few years, but I am also
- 11 concerned about why there has been no long-term
- 12 planning starting 20 years ago with the last SSA
- 13 for water. Starting to then look at 20, 30, 50
- 14 years because this is not a mom and pop
- 15 operation where we say hey, we got to have more
- 16 money, let's go out and borrow.
- 17 I have a question. I have
- 18 seen 2 numbers floated about here. One for 43
- 19 million dollars in a power point display, and
- 20 then the mailing they talk about 46 million
- 21 dollars. Inflation? Deflation? Someone
- 22 explain that for me. If this was a
- 23 typographical error, it should have been a sign
- 24 outside stating such or should have been brought

- 1 up in the power point display.
- The means of financing, I
- 3 agree with the previous gentleman that you got
- 4 to tell us what the cost is, over what term, and
- 5 lock it in. I don't know about you, but you
- 6 guys go over 12 percent, I'm going to be selling
- 7 my house and moving. As a matter of fact I am
- 8 planning on moving in about 6 years anyway.
- 9 Another question was brought
- 10 up earlier, I would like clarification on the
- 11 2016, 2017 thing. Do we have to use the water
- 12 by then or start pumping the water? Protection
- 13 against bacterial contaminants getting into the
- 14 system. Engineering studies done on that.
- 15 Looking out 5, 10 years, what will we need to
- 16 do?
- 17 Also something that has not
- 18 been brought up at all, but I am wondering
- 19 about, is this the total cost of the pipeline,
- 20 the connections to the local service providers,
- 21 the local villages? Or is there going to be
- 22 another tax imposed? Oh, we forgot about that.
- 23 Because I have seen this done in other
- 24 communities for other things. Is it -- was

- 1 there a study done on this, and if so who paid
- 2 for it? When and what were the results of the
- 3 study?
- 4 I'm just getting a little
- 5 tired of my government and my country lying to
- 6 me, not telling me about the costs up front or
- 7 what the potential problems are. Well, gee,
- 8 maybe if we find some kind of super
- 9 contamination that is going to cost 5 million
- 10 dollars extra, that's an act of God type of
- 11 event. But to not even look at the potential
- 12 for contaminated water or things like that to me
- 13 is irresponsible government. Thank you.
- MR. JASICA: Robert Johnson,
- 15 Karol Threadgill, Bruce Swenson?
- 16 MR. JOHNSON: Robert Johnson. I
- 17 would like to also talk about the general
- 18 obligation bonds. That would take a vote of the
- 19 people that are involved who has to pay the
- 20 bills. I would like to third the general
- 21 obligation bonds. That will take a vote. That
- 22 will be a way of financing the project.
- 23 The other thing is the
- 24 backup systems. I understand that we are

- 1 keeping the wells. And so we are going to have
- 2 the same wells available as a backup even if we
- 3 go to Lake Michigan water. I'm a little
- 4 concerned about the science that is involved
- 5 with where we go.
- 6 We take everything from the
- 7 engineers, and I am an engineer, and we take
- 8 everything that says that's the way things are.
- 9 Well, I'm old enough to know that in the 1970s
- 10 we were entering an ice age, and that was going
- 11 to come for sure, but that turned into global
- 12 warming.
- About 8 years ago, we had 3
- 14 years supply of natural gas and there wasn't
- 15 going to be any left. We now have a 100 year
- 16 supply. So this science is not always supported
- of exactly what is happening. So that we are
- 18 running out of water, and yet water reports that
- 19 say the water is pretty good. It meets all the
- 20 requirements. Never has it said we had a water
- 21 issue in the area.
- 22 So I guess as we look at it,
- 23 I also, unlike the another gentleman I do read
- 24 the paper, I see the board when people weren't

- 1 allowed to get involved in decisions, this
- 2 election commission deal, the county board says
- 3 that's a bad thing so we are going to sue the
- 4 state because we want to have the local people
- 5 involved in the decision so we can get the
- 6 electorate involved.
- 7 So I ask you to do that. We
- 8 are asking here to be involved. And that would
- 9 have been well, it is an emergency now. The
- 10 window closes in another year. We have to do
- 11 this right now. Well, I don't think it is that
- 12 much of an emergency.
- MR. JASICA: Karol Threadgill,
- 14 Bruce Swenson? Mr. Chairman, I have no other
- 15 requests for public comment or testimony.
- 16 MR. LAWLOR: At this time are
- 17 there any other comments from the public? If
- 18 you can fill out a card? Everyone who has not
- 19 spoken and who has not gotten sworn in, please
- 20 stand and raise your right hand.
- 21 (Public sworn)
- 22 MS. KARR: Nancy Karr. I have a
- 23 couple points when you were flipping through
- 24 your power point there. The map showed only one

- 1 connection point for the Village of Lindenhurst.
- 2 I know that we have a backup water supply with
- 3 our shallow wells, but maybe it would be a wise
- 4 thing to consider a second point of connection
- 5 with the Village of Lindenhurst.
- 6 Another question is
- 7 following up on the comments of the gentleman
- 8 about the financing. Is the interest rate fixed
- 9 or variable? That hasn't been addressed. I do
- 10 like the idea of the Illinois EPA loans at half
- 11 the market rate. That sounds great. It would
- 12 get the term of the loan down to 20 years
- 13 instead of 30 years.
- 14 My big concern is with the
- 15 financing because if we are paying market rates
- 16 for 30 years, it's going to come close to
- doubling the cost of the project for the
- 18 taxpayers. Thank you.
- MR. JASICA: Next we have of Lou
- 20 DiFalco, Roy Werner, John Lewis?
- MR. DIFALCO: Lou DiFalco. Thank
- 22 you. Would you people mind holding up your hand
- 23 if you have water deficiencies at your house
- 24 right now? I see 3. I'm terribly sorry for you

- 1 for that too that you do have that problem
- 2 compared to the amount of people here and these
- 3 types of problems, 43 million dollars for what
- 4 is representing maybe a small handful of the
- 5 people in these areas? I will donate something
- 6 to help them. If everybody would, I think we
- 7 can come a lot less than 43 million dollars.
- 8 I would like to see -- I'm
- 9 not a hydrologist. I don't understand these
- 10 studies, but I would like to at least see one.
- 11 Do we really have this deficiency. We live in a
- 12 saturated area. This is what makes this area
- 13 grow is because ample water to my knowledge. I
- 14 would like to see a hydrology study and a
- 15 bonafide stamped study that has been overseen by
- 16 some type of government official that it is for
- 17 sure true. Thank you.
- MR. JASICA: Roy Werner, John
- 19 Lewis, and L. Grant?
- 20 MR. WERNER: Hi. I'm Roy Werner
- 21 from Lindenhurst. I have lived here 15 years.
- 22 When I moved here, my taxes were \$3000. Now
- 23 they are \$9000. The neighborhood, the
- 24 Lindenhurst taxes have gone up. The garbage

- 1 taxes have gone up. There is 9 pensions on my
- 2 tax bill for Lake Villa and Lindenhurst, which I
- 3 don't get a pension.
- 4 Like the fellow said
- 5 earlier, the taxes are just getting to where we
- 6 can't afford them anymore. I notice on the map
- 7 back there there is like 15 forest preserves on
- 8 that map. The County has money for forest
- 9 preserves, people to maintain them, bike paths.
- 10 That's all great. That's what makes it a nice
- 11 place to live.
- But if this water program is
- 13 necessary, maybe we can take a little bit of
- 14 money from some of the other programs that
- benefit few and use it to pay the \$250 per lot
- 16 instead of tacking it on top of what we already
- 17 are saddled with.
- 18 You know, it is just like
- 19 our own budgets. We all have likes and wants.
- 20 We all would like a new car or vacation, but we
- 21 all have limits. The government also has to
- 22 have a limit and got to work within their means
- 23 because there is a limit to our pockets too.
- 24 Most of the other points I

- 1 would make have already been made, but I would
- 2 say this regarding the petition. When I counted
- 3 up those lot numbers roughly on the mailer we
- 4 got, there were like 12,000 lot numbers. I
- 5 don't know how any of us are going to get around
- 6 to 12,000 people to get signatures. You know,
- 7 as individuals I don't think that is even
- 8 possible.
- 9 I would beg the County since
- 10 they were able to send out the 20 page mailing
- 11 to us to send out a referendum, take a vote, let
- 12 the people decide.
- MR. JASICA: John Lewis, L.
- 14 Grant, Tracy Castro?
- MR. LEWIS: I'm John Lewis. I
- 16 got here late because I work late and traffic
- 17 and everything else. But from what I have
- 18 heard, I agree with everything I have heard in
- 19 the last 10 minutes. Our taxes are too high. I
- 20 got 2 houses on Hutchins Road. I had them a
- 21 long time. We got great water. I see no reason
- 22 to do it.
- Everytime they come up with
- 24 one of these studies, if you get the right

- 1 people, you can get studies to say the opposite
- 2 thing. You always find the right people to do
- 3 what you want to do on a study. As somebody
- 4 said about getting the government, I would like
- 5 to see an independent not a government study.
- 6 For some reason I don't trust the government.
- 7 So anyway I want to say I'm
- 8 against this thing. You can drill more wells,
- 9 whatever you got to do. It is a lot cheaper
- 10 than this other stuff. I don't care what you
- 11 say, when you raise our taxes 200 bucks, it
- 12 never comes out to 200 bucks. Every time there
- is a school referendum and you tell us how much
- 14 money it is going to be, it doesn't come out
- 15 that much.
- Somebody mentioned about the
- 17 forest preserve, take a bunch of money from
- 18 them. I'm sorry. We got enough forest
- 19 preserves. You have that nice underground
- 20 tunnel that you spent millions of dollars and
- 21 screwed up Grand Avenue traffic. Take some of
- 22 that money. Plus the Taj Mahal on 132 -- that's
- 23 a whole other story.
- MR. JASICA: L. Grant, Tracy

- 1 Castro?
- MR. GRANT: I'm Larry Grant. I
- 3 didn't know what the population of this area
- 4 would be. I understand it is 12,000 residents.
- 5 Obviously we don't have 50 percent of them here
- 6 so perhaps take a little poll now. How many
- 7 people here are for this project? How many
- 8 people are against it? That says it right
- 9 there.
- 10 MR. JASICA: Tracy Castro?
- 11 MS. CASTRO: Hi, I am Tracy
- 12 Castro. I used to work for an engineer. He
- 13 said that this topic came up 20 to 25 years ago.
- 14 It is not a new topic. And part of the problem
- 15 -- I don't know how low the wells are and how
- 16 much problems they truly are at this moment.
- 17 Part of the problem is getting into CLCJAWA if
- 18 we need to.
- 19 So I think it might be
- 20 helpful if the County or the engineer or whoever
- 21 can explain it truthfully so that we understand
- 22 what happens if we don't go on now, and then in
- 23 10 or 15 years where else can we go for water
- 24 and who is going to -- because I know CLCJAWA

- 1 can only handle a certain amount of flow.
- 2 You know, I may not be
- 3 explaining it correctly, but I don't think
- 4 everybody knows what happens if we don't go with
- 5 it. And maybe we don't need it right now, but
- if we don't take it now, do we lose our chance?
- 7 Obviously I don't want to
- 8 spend money. I have been out of work for a
- 9 year. But we need to know both things before we
- 10 can decide if we are for it or against it.
- 11 Thank you.
- MR. JASICA: We have no further
- 13 requests for oral testimony.
- 14 MR. LAWLOR: Let it be recorded
- 15 that all persons desiring to be heard have been
- 16 given an opportunity to present oral and written
- 17 testimony with respect to the establishment of
- 18 the Special Service Area and the issuance of the
- 19 SSA bonds. Oral testimony and public comment
- 20 are now closed.
- 21 I just wanted to say how
- 22 much we really do appreciate hearing from all of
- 23 you and that all of you took the time to come
- 24 out tonight. I realize you have busy schedules

- 1 and a lot going on. The County Board hears a
- 2 lot of big issues. A lot of times people don't
- 3 show up to explain and articulate their
- 4 positions. So I think we all very much
- 5 appreciate so many of the members of the public
- 6 coming to learn about the project and articulate
- 7 their support.
- 8 The County Board has heard
- 9 all comment, testimony, protests, and objections
- 10 at this hearing. The conclusion of this hearing
- 11 will start the 60 day objection period, and all
- 12 further objections or petitions must be filed
- 13 with the Lake County Clerk.
- I think we have one question
- on process and procedure from Member Maine.
- MS. MAINE: Thank you residents
- 17 for coming. I just wanted to kind of do a wrap
- 18 up question, and I have been taking notes, and I
- 19 just want to have this as a suggestion for when
- 20 we put answers on the website or anything that
- 21 we give to residents.
- 22 I kind of heard I think a
- 23 good way to organize this would be about 6
- 24 general areas. For example, I heard a lot of

- 1 questions related to why the 60 days, why the 51
- 2 percent, why the mailings? So to me that falls
- 3 under things that are legally required of us by
- 4 the State.
- 5 So I think it would be good
- 6 to have an explanation as to what our State
- 7 legal requirements that we need to follow are.
- 8 I think that would be helpful for people. There
- 9 were a lot of great questions about the studies,
- 10 have there been studies. So I don't know if we
- 11 can have as pdf links or something, because a
- 12 lot of these are long documents, because there
- 13 have been a number of studies by regional areas.
- 14 There is studies going back 15, 20 years by the
- 15 National Science Foundation looking at long-term
- 16 water issues. So there are a number of those
- 17 studies.
- 18 I think if we could have
- 19 some of those linked, both the full studies
- 20 which are long and those that have executive
- 21 summaries for people who are not a hydrologist
- 22 so people can look at some of those executive
- 23 summaries that have been done by, I don't know,
- 24 at least 4 or 5 different agencies, some with no

- 1 relationship to us as a government agency.
- 2 I think another area that
- 3 would be helpful would be really an explanation
- 4 of sort of the timing and the Illinois
- 5 Department of Natural Resources that explains
- 6 the allocation process. There were a number of
- 7 questions on the timing and explaining that as
- 8 long as we are moving forward in our process
- 9 with our allocation, we will be fine on the
- 10 timing. But if we don't use it, we will lose
- 11 it. And perhaps an explanation of the fact that
- 12 there is -- that the State has only so many
- 13 gallons that they are allowed to allocate and
- 14 that we are almost near the end of that
- 15 allocation.
- 16 So in terms of that endless
- 17 resource, there is only a certain number, and we
- 18 have a percent, and after that that is gone.
- 19 Other people are not able to get on. I think
- 20 that would be helpful.
- 21 A fourth area I think would
- 22 be helpful would be related to health issues,
- 23 explaining about perhaps the radium that is in
- 24 the deep wells. The radium level which

- 1 long-term exposure does cause bone cancer. And
- 2 the barium, the long-term relationship of that.
- 3 The studies about that going up in the deep
- 4 wells. As people use the shallow wells, perhaps
- 5 an explanation of how towns need to blend their
- 6 shallow and deep wells to make sure that they
- 7 are under those levels.
- 8 You can touch on the mercury
- 9 question and the bio accumulation of how those
- 10 metals are different when they are in water and
- 11 in fish.
- 12 Number 5 would be different
- 13 explanations of some of the different financing
- 14 options that are out there. Maybe some examples
- of some of the things that we have done in the
- 16 past with other SSA's. Looking at both the
- 17 options and explanations of the rationale behind
- 18 different ones. Sometimes pushing costs to the
- 19 long-term users.
- 20 And then I think the sixth
- 21 one would be different engineering options in
- 22 terms of why, you know, again there was a
- 23 schematic, but sort of talk about some of the
- 24 engineering and the sorts of things that people

- 1 brought up. Water pressure, perhaps going into
- 2 that. Water treatment, in terms of bacterial.
- 3 Water purity. Things that CLCJAWA does
- 4 currently.
- 5 I think about those 6 areas,
- 6 I think that kind of hits it. That might be a
- 7 helpful way for people here to go to the website
- 8 and for people in the future kind of
- 9 categorizing it that way. Do you think we can
- 10 do it this way?
- MR. LAWLOR: Absolutely. I'd
- 12 like to thank member and professor Ann Maine.
- 13 PUBLIC: Is there a website?
- 14 (Discussion with members)
- 15 MR. LAWLOR: This will be on the
- 16 County website. Lake County IL dot Gov / Lake
- 17 Michigan Water.
- 18 PUBLIC: So the referendum is
- 19 out? It is to you people now?
- 20 MR. LAWLOR: The process for the
- 21 SSA hearing is to allow everybody to speak. We
- 22 have closed that. If you have questions, please
- 23 --
- 24 PUBLIC: You didn't answer the

- 1 question. It's in your hands? Not our hands
- 2 anymore?
- 3 MR. LAWLOR: I'm honestly not
- 4 going to entertain public comment after it is
- 5 closed. You can pose questions to staff. At
- 6 this time I will entertain a motion to adjourn.
- 7 (Motion by Member Maine, second by Member
- 8 Taylor) Roll call?
- 9 MR. WALLER: Member Pedersen?
- MEMBER PEDERSEN: Aye.
- 11 MR. WALLER: Member Hewitt?
- MEMBER HEWITT: Aye.
- MR. WALLER: Member Weber?
- 14 MEMBER WEBER: Aye.
- MR. WALLER: Member Carter?
- MEMBER CARTER: Aye.
- MR. WALLER: Member Carey?
- 18 MEMBER CAREY: Aye.
- MR. WALLER: Member Carlson?
- 20 MEMBER CARLSON: Aye.
- MR. WALLER: Member Durkin?
- MEMBER DURKIN: Aye.
- MR. WALLER: Member O'Kelly?
- MEMBER O'KELLY: Aye.
