

# CORPORATE POLICY

## I. POLICY:

- A. The Lake County Health Department and Community Health Center's All employees, consultants, interns, volunteers, and others who act on behalf of the Health Department 's behalf ("Staff") have a responsibility to Health Department patients, federal and state governments, and other health department funders, and the communities served to conduct themselves in a responsible manner.
- B. Rules and regulations governing employee behavior are necessary for efficient business operations, and benefit and safety of all employees. Conduct that interferes with operations, discredits the agency, or is offensive to co-workers, customers, or visitors will not be tolerated.
- C. Management Responsibility: The immediate supervisor, Associate Director or Director must assume, and are charged with, the responsibility for ensuring that the conduct of Staff everyone—they supervise complies with the Standards of Conduct.
- D. Individual Responsibility: New employees <u>are to</u> be made aware of these rules and regulations during <u>their initial</u> orientation. <u>Rrules and regulations will periodically be</u> reviewed with all employees as necessary. Every <u>staff</u> member of the Health <u>Department's Staff</u> is responsible for ensuring that his or her conduct is consistent with these Standards of Conduct, with the Health Department's policies and procedures, and with generally acceptable standards of professionalism, courtesy, and respect.
- E. Employees are expected to be familiar with and follow the laws and code of ethics governing the practice of their profession, to comply as well as assuring compliance with applicable Federal, State and local laws and regulations, and fulfill all contractual grant obligations.
- F. Violations of Standards of Conduct: Employees should promptly report concerns regarding compliance with these Standards of Conduct. This report should be made initially through standard management channels, beginning with the employee's immediate supervisor, Program Coordinator, Associate Director or Director. As an alternative, an employee may make such a report to the Human Resources Manager or Director. Any formal complaint brought to the attention of management through this process will be investigated thoroughly with the goal of an attempt to resolving the issue. Raising such concerns will not jeopardize the terms and conditions of employment of the reporting individual. All staff must cooperate fully in the investigation of any alleged violation of these Standards of Conduct. Misconduct. Any staff member who makes intentionally makes false accusations regarding misconduct or compliance concern-is subject to disciplinary action.
- G. Any violation of the Lake County Health Department and Community Health Center's policies and procedures, or any conduct considered inappropriate or unsatisfactory, may subject the employee to disciplinary action, up to and including termination.



- H. The following list is intended to provide only general guidance for the types of behaviors that are generally considered unacceptable while in the employment of the Health Department: They include, but are not limited to:
  - 1. Violation of the Corporate Compliance standards and procedures;
  - Conviction of a criminal felony offense;
  - 3. Conviction of a misdemeanor offense requiring probation or incarceration;
  - Failure to self-disclose any criminal conviction, felony, misdemeanor, or loss of driving privileges that occurs while in the employ of the Health Department;
  - 5. Fighting with, threatening, intimidating, assaulting, yelling or using harsh or profane language towards anyone; (See Workplace Violence Policy 8-7)
  - Engaging in any form of sexual or other harassment; (See Harassment Policy 2-14)
  - 7. Falsifying or altering any agency records, reports, medical documents, treatment plans or attendance records;
  - Willful misrepresentation or concealment of any requested information during the hiring process or of any fact or evidence during departmental agency investigations;
  - 9. Using your the position of employment to secure special privileges or exemptions, personally personally, or for others; (See Conflict of Interest, Bribery Policy 10-5)
  - Violating any federal or state law, or Lake County Health Department rules and regulations pertaining to client confidentiality.
  - Accessing patient, employee, or family records or other confidential <del>10.</del>11 information for personal use or knowledge or when a person acts on using this information in a manner unrelated to Lake County Health Department business or to the detriment of the other person;
  - 44.12. Reporting to work or responding to a call-in situation in an unfit condition, including being under the influence of drugs, alcohol, marijuana, cocaine or any other substances. (See Drug Free Workplace Policy 10-9);
  - 42.13. Failure or refusal to sign authorizations to conduct tests or background checks based upon reasonable suspicion or other compelling reasons;
  - 43.14. Theft of or willful damage to an employee's, customer's, or Health Department property;
  - 44.15. Misuse of Health Department property and/or unauthorized removal of company documents, equipment, tools, supplies or confidential information of any nature.



- 45.16. Possession of unauthorized firearm or concealed weapon on agency premises or during the course of while performing your duties;
- 46.17. Refusing to follow management's legitimate and lawful instructions concerning a job related matter; i.e. being insubordinate.
- 47.18. Happropriate, arassing, bullying, offensive, disrespectful or discourteous conduct.

- 18.19. Conduct unbecoming of a public employee that would which adversely impacts the public's trust.
- 49.20. Excessive absenteeism or absence from the job without prior authorization;
- 20.21. Repeated failure to report to work as scheduled, including failure to report to er being at the properassigned work station prepared to perform job dutiesprepared to work promptly at, ready for work, at the assigned at starting time;
- 21.22. Gambling while on duty;
- 22.23. Sleeping, loafing or disruptive horseplay while on duty;
- 23.24. Unsatisfactory job performance
- , including and generallynot performing assigned duties as required;
- 25. Repeated violation of standard dress code; (See Dress Code Policy 2-17)
- 26. Failing to wear assigned safety equipment or failing to abide by safety rules and regulations.
- 27. Violations of any Lake County Health Department and Community Health Center's personnel policies or any Service Areaprogram specific policies and procedures.

### II. SCOPE:

All Lake County Health Department and Community Health Center employees' consultants, interns, volunteers and others who act on behalf of the Health Department.

### PROCEDURE: III.

- All employees, consultants, interns, and volunteers employees are expected to act in a professional manner while engaged in work-related duties and activities, whether on Health Department property or any other location during the performance of duties.
- The Lake County Health Department and Community Health Center recognizes that a mutually satisfying and productive employment relationship requires the communication of and adherence to acceptable performance standards and workplace behaviors.

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- C. Any changes to these rules, regulations, policies and procedures should are to be communicated to employees in a timely manner, with sufficient advanced notice.
- D. All employees <u>mustare requested to</u> sign an acknowledgment that he/she has received a copy of our Standards of Conduct Policy and that compliance with the policy is a term and condition of employment.
