Department Overview



Primary Functions:

Provide constitutionally mandated legal representation to:

- Indigent accused—adults and juveniles, charged with criminal offenses
- Parents accused of the abuse, neglect, dependency of children
- Respondents to Mental Health/Medication petitions
- Sexually Violent and Sexually Dangerous Persons Petitions
- Post-Conviction Petitioners
- Individuals accused of contempt of court

2025 Department Budget



\$6,157,437

- Approximately 89% of budget is related to personnel costs
- 100% funded by the County
- Two thirds of Public Defender salary reimbursed by the State
- Nominal revenue generated by imposition of Public Defender Fees which is paid to general fund
- Budget decrease from FY24 due to personnel reduction (GAL division)

Department Overview



The Public Defender's Office staffs 15 courtrooms and handles approximately 25 court calls daily. This includes:

- 5 Felony courtrooms (Staffed 5 days/week)
- 6 Misdemeanor/Traffic courtrooms (Staffed 5 days/week)
- 1 First Appearance courtroom (Staffed 7 days/week)
- 1 Detention courtroom (staffed 5 days/week)
- 2 Juvenile courtrooms (Staffed 6 days/week)
- 1 Specialty & Fitness/MH courtroom (Staffed 5 days/week)

- Approximately 15% increase in new case appointments LY;
 TY 30% increase in felony appointments in 1Q 25
- PFA procedures have directly impacted new case appointments
- Change in case management system to eDefender has impacted statistics. We will continue to work to address deficiencies.

Accomplishments in the Previous 12 Months:



- Created processes to meet demands of implementation of SAFE-T Act
- Implementing new case management system—E-Defender
- Implemented new digital evidence management system—Axon
- Continue to refer clients to Specialty Court programs to address substance abuse and mental health issues and potentially reduce recidivism
- Implemented procedures to assure effective attorney/client communications with inmates housed in McHenry County Jail
- Increase in new hire applications following Compensation Study adjustments
- Connected clients with SA/MH treatment referrals and aided with employment and housing assistance

Upcoming Challenges



- Recruitment and Retention of Attorneys
 - Inability to recruit qualified attorneys (3 vacancies currently)
 - Loss of staff due to lack of competitive salaries
- Increased workloads
 - Increased use of body cam video
 - Increase in number of appointments for violent and complex crimes
 - Appointed on every arrestee by default due to PFA
- Digital Discovery Retention
 - Need to protect confidentiality of client files
- Pending Legislation establishing a Statewide Public Defender
 - Caseload standards might impact staffing needs
