




Trends and Forecast



23

- Workforce availability is the #1 economic challenge
 - Across all industry sectors
 - Labor Force 2yr Change: (26,741)
 - Employment 2yr Change: (27,637)
 - Unemployed: 14,360 (4.0%)
- Over 25,000 current open positions
- Employee turnover is up
- Employers lowering requirements to find candidates, leading to skills gap





Trends and Forecast



- Through Oct 2021, the occupancy at Lake County hotels was 48.6%
 - Pre-COVID (Oct. 2019) occupancy was 64.8%
- Revenue from guest rooms is down \$61 million over 2019
 - Not including the millions lost in food & beverage sales at hotels



Small Business Assistance

ARPA Categories: Job Training Assistance & Small Business Econ. Assistance



Overview:

Top Recommendation

- Workforce Development is requesting \$1.7 million in ARPA funding to expand job training programs
 - Assist small businesses with wage subsidies for new hires
 - Reimburse occupational skills training to broaden the talent pool
 - Serve the long-term unemployed

Goal:

- Develop workforce development solutions with employers to meet hiring needs and address the skills gap
- Connect 80 job seekers to work-based learning opportunities
- Subsidize wages for the newly hired to earn as they learn
- Reimburse occupational training for 20 job seekers assessed as needing additional technical skills
- Successfully transition job seekers into employment

Investment:

- \$1.5M (+) work-based training wages
- \$200K (+) occupational training tuition
- Leveraging US DOL WIOA Grants
- NOTE: 2 years of funding requested with option to expand if the need continues, and funding made available for an additional staff member.

Workforce Outreach and Recruitment



ARPA Categories: Job Training & Small Business Economic Assistance

Overview:

 Develop outreach and recruitment strategies to increase services in underserved communities and provide greater access to workshops, career services, skills development and jobs.

• Goal:

- Outreach and recruitment strategies to underserved communities
- Expand the outreach of WDD beyond the Job Center
- Collaborate with community and state partners to increase awareness of services

• Investment:

- \$100K
- Leveraging US DOL WIOA Grants
- Submitted by: Workforce Development (WDD)





Small Manufacturer Automation



ARPA Category: Public Health: Other Economic Support

Overview:

- To address the severe labor shortage, many larger manufacturers are investing in automation and process enhancements. Smaller firms have not had the bandwidth to evaluate and implement these enhancements, though they could actually see some of the biggest gains.
- This project would establish an automation matching grant program for small manufacturers (less than 100 employees), to help them build capacity and create higher paying jobs.

Goals:

• Support small manufacturers, enabling productivity growth, and upskilling current jobs and employees. Training of existing workers to operate new equipment and processes.

Investment:

- \$2,000,000
 - Grants would be a 2-for-1 match, capped at \$250,000 each. Company would be required to contribute \$125,000 for a total of \$375,000. Most projects would likely be half of that amount.

Support Hospitality Businesses



ARPA Category: Public Health-Aid to Tourism, Travel, or Hospitality

Overview:

- Rebuild the visitor economy in the county
- Assist restaurants, hotels and other hospitality businesses which continue to suffer the effects of the pandemic.

Goals:

- Marketing campaign in summer of 2022 (\$150,000 plus \$150,000 match)
- Business Incentive Fund aid in securing in-person meetings and sports events to bring back guests to hotels. (\$250,000)
- Marketing Support Scholarship Program To support approximately 30 small hospitality businesses per year that suffered financial hardships during pandemic, especially in underserved communities like Waukegan, Zion and North Chicago. (\$25,000)
- Destination/Tourism Marketing Intelligence (\$200,000) mobile technology to measure visitor trips to Lake County and provide data on visitor origins, volume, activities and overnight stays.

Investment:

- \$625,000
- Submitted by: Lake County Convention and Visitors Bureau (VLC)





Economic Development and Jobs



ARPA Category: Clean Water - Other Sewer Infrastructure

Overview:

- Bring Sewer Infrastructure to the Lake County Gateway Zoning District (225 acres) at NE corner of Rte. 173/I-94
- In 2019, site lost a very significant economic development deal (400+ jobs, \$115M) because it did not already have sewer service pulled to the site.
- This project, already studied by LCPW, would pull sewer service from Antioch through this site, all the way to Hwy 41.

Goals:

- Making a prime site shovel-ready, could bring hundreds of jobs to the area
- Create significant incremental property tax revenue, especially for the Beach Park Middle School and Zion Benton High School Districts.
- Investment: \$16,700,000
- Submitted by: Lake County Partners / Lake County Public Works





Regional Economic Support ARPA Category: Public Health - Other Economic Support



Overview:

 Regional Economic Development - CMAP is currently funding an assessment of the region to address economically disadvantaged areas and areas disproportionally impacted by COVID-19 throughout all 7 counties, plus the City of Chicago.

• Goals:

- Establish a regional economic development organization whose focus would be job creation/development.
- Collaborate and coordinate on economic development and COVID-19 recovery activities.
- Promote the region's economic development attractiveness and economic mobility opportunities to advance the region with economic strategies to support global competitiveness and inclusive growth.
- The primary outcome of this project will be business attraction. Much of that audience is currently outside of Illinois.

Investment:

- \$2.5 M over 3 years
- Submitted by: Lake County Partners





Summary of Recommendations



Direct Small Business Assistance **LakeCounty



- Workforce -

 - work-pased training wages ~ 80 people
 Occupational training tuition ~ 20 people
 Anticipated to serve ~ 50 small businesses

- Expand Summer Youth program to be year-round?
- Manufacturing
 - Automation and Process Improvement Grants (equipment, software, training)
- Hospitality
 - Marketing Support scholarships ~ 30 Small Businesses



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
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Invest in County (Local) Operations



- Revenue Replacement / Provision of Government Services
 - Smaller, one-time investments / expenses ("NPR" list)
 - Technology investments
 - Implementation costs [Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP), RMS / JMS, etc.]
 - Capabilities to further integrate and expand remote workforce
 - Enterprise-wide cyber-security resources and capabilities
 - Projects with local entities
 - Partner on mutually important projects
 - Require / request matching funds
- Premium Pay for authorized employees



Premium Pay



Guidance

- May provide premium pay to eligible workers performing essential work during COVID-19
- "Work involving regular in-person interactions or regular physical handling of items that were also handled by others"
- Individuals who teleworked from a residence may not receive premium pay

Analysis

- Numerous second and third order effects (with risk)
- Very complex to implement
- No recommendation at this time
 - Continuing analysis and pursuit of alternatives
