Hazards	Mitigation
Eye hazard	Safety glasses to be worn at all times.
Struck by	Use signalperson when backing trucks on site.
Caught in-between	Communicate clear, planned path of travel to driver.
Skin irritation	Avoid contact with cement products. Use proper PPE. Wash off affected area if cement comes into contact with skin

Hazards	Mitigation
Caught in-between	Don't place yourself in a pinch point. Stay out of machinery's working radius. Know the weights of rig components and capacity of assist equipment.
Struck by	Use a signalperson when backing up trucks. Communicate with driver the planned route.

Hazards	Mitigation
Lifting – muscle strain	Use proper lifting techniques. Pre-task stretching required

Task: Hoisting

Hazards	Mitigation
Pinching/rolling objects	Chock material that may have a tendency to roll.
Struck by	Inspect rigging daily. Qualified riggers will be used.
Falling Object	Clear the fall zone.
Falling Debris	Inspect and clean off object to be hoisted of any loose debris
Electrocution – Property Damage	Obtain a valid Utility Locating Request Number. Observe work zone for any overhead utilities/obstructions. Maintain the required distance from underground and overhead utilities. Non-conductive tag lines will be used when working near power lines.
Moving Parts	Keep body parts clear from any moving components on the equipment. Shut down equipment if working on or near moving parts is necessary.
Slips, trips, falls	Keep walking pathes free of debris and other tripping hazards. Practice safe ladder usage procedures, including maintaining 3 points of contact.

Task: Assembly / Disassembly

Hazards	Mitigation
	Before commencing assembly/disassembly operations, the A/D director must ensure that the crew members understand the following: 1) their tasks 2) the hazards associated with their tasks 3) the hazardous positions/locations that they need to avoid.
Equipment Roll-over	Ensure ground conditions are firm, drained and graded sufficiently enough to support crane and assist equipment.

Crush hazard	Watch for trucks backing up. Use signalperson when backing up trucks and clear out a travel path. Follow manufacturer's procedure regarding assembly and disassembly. Prevent unintended dangerous movements. Provide adequate support and stability for all parts of the equipment. Position yourself in such a way as to minimize the exposure to unintended movements or collapse of parts.
Struck by	Qualified riggers/signalpersons will be used. Inspect rigging daily/prior to use. Verify weights of crane parts and do not exceed assist equipment's capacity. Clear the fall zone. Use tag lines when required to control the load.
Caught in-between	Never position yourself in a location where you may be injured or crushed by the movement of the crane or load.
Falls	Fall protection required for employees who are on a walking/working surface with an unprotected side or edge more than 15 feet above a lower level.

Task: Welding and torch setup

Hazards	Mitigation
Lifting – muscle strain	Practice safe lifting techniques. Get help or equipment assistance if object is heavy. Welding cables, compressed gas cylinders, etc.

Task: Welding and burning

Hazards	Mitigation
Fire	Remove combustibles from work area. Have a fire extinguisher available/accessable within the work zone. Fire extinguisher must be tagged and up to date.
Electric shock	Make sure welding cables are in good working condition free of any cuts or abrasions.
Vision hazard	Use proper shaded lens for your operation. Safety glasses to be worn at all times.

Burn	Do not place any part of your body on material that has recently been welded on, flame cut, or hot enough to cause a burn to human skin or clothing.
Adjacent activities	Be sure that activities by others around your work area do not pose a hazard to you while being under a welding hood. Shield your operation if the exposure of welding arcs to others/public exists. Ensure that the sparks or molten metal/weldment produced by your operation does not pose a hazard to others/public.

Task: Grinding

Hazards	Mitigation
Vision Hazard	Face shield to be worn during grinding operations. Manufacturer's guard must remain on tool at all times.
