## **Department Overview**



#### **Primary Functions:**

#### **Provide legal representation to:**

- Indigent accused—adults and juveniles, charged with criminal offenses
- Parents accused of the abuse, neglect, dependency of children
- Respondents to Mental Health/Medication petitions
- Sexually Violent and Sexually Dangerous Persons
- Post-Conviction Petitioners
- Guardian Ad Litem to abused, neglected, dependent minors & those pending adoption

## **Department Overview**



The Public Defender's Office staffs 14 courtrooms and handles approximately 22 court calls on a daily basis. This includes:

- 5 Felony courtrooms (Staffed 5 days/week)
- 5 Misdemeanor/Traffic courtrooms (Staffed 5 days/week)
- 1 Bond courtroom (Staffed 7 days/week)
- 2 Juvenile courtrooms (Staffed 6 days/week)
- 1 Specialty & Fitness courtroom (Staffed 4-5 days/week)

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## **Statistics**



	2020	2021
New Case Appointments:	8,819	7896
<b>Supplemental Appointments:</b>	2,107	1435

- This is approximately a 9% decrease in appointments between 2020 & 2021
- 50% decrease in Delinquency petitions between 2020-2021
- 25% decrease in GAL representation between 2020-2021
- Changes in how cases are counted beginning January, 2022

## **2022 Department Budget**



\$5,685,908

Approximately 89% of budget is related to personnel costs

# **Accomplishments in the Previous 12 Months:**



- Continued to provide representation during COVID
  - Seeing clients in person and jail
  - Attending court proceedings in person and via ZOOM
  - Worked to educate clients on how to access ZOOM
- Through participation in Safety & Justice Challenge grant, worked to reduce jail population, address racial and ethnic disparity in jail, provided text reminders of upcoming court dates
- Continue to create and implement a new case management system—E-Defender
- Continue to refer clients to Specialty Court programs to address substance abuse and mental health issues and potentially reduce recidivism
- Enhanced and fully staffed GAL division

## **Upcoming Challenges**



- Recruitment and Retention of Attorneys
  - Inability to recruit qualified attorneys (3 vacancies currently)
  - Loss of staff due to lack of competitive salaries
- Unfunded Mandates created by Crime Bill legislation
  - Increased use of body cam video increases workloads
  - Additional court dates for detention hearings may require additional personnel & space
  - Increase use of EHM and cost to defendants
- Digital Discovery Retention
  - Need to protect confidentiality of client files
  - No ability to store digital discovery
