American Rescue Plan Act

- \$1.9 trillion American Rescue Plan (ARPA) was signed into law on March 11, 2021.
- \$350 billion is allocated to States, Tribes, Territories and Local Governments via the Coronavirus State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (CSLFRF)

"...the SLFRF program provides vital resources for state, local, and Tribal governments to respond to the pandemic and its economic effects and to replace revenue lost due to the public health emergency, preventing cuts to government services."



ARPA Timeline

- ARPA funds must be obligated (encumbered) by December 31, 2024
- ARPA funds must be expended by December 31, 2026
- Funds that are not obligated or expended by these deadlines must be returned to US Treasury





ARPA and Lake County

- Through the American Rescue Plan Act State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund, Lake County received \$135.2 million
- As of February 2023, \$90 million of that award had been allocated to projects that respond to the COVID-19 pandemic, including:
 - Community and Household Assistance
 - Public Health
 - Business and Economic Development
 - Infrastructure
 - Improvement of County Operations
- Thus far, almost all projects have been proposed by units of County government



Non-County ARPA Proposals

"Treasury recognizes that many nonprofits play important roles in their communities, and some may have experienced public health or negative economic impacts during the pandemic. As such, under the interim final rule and the final rule, nonprofits may be impacted by the pandemic and receive assistance as a beneficiary, as described above, and/or be a subrecipient providing services on behalf of a recipient."



Application Methodology

ARPA and Uniform Guidance (UG) training for prospective applicants



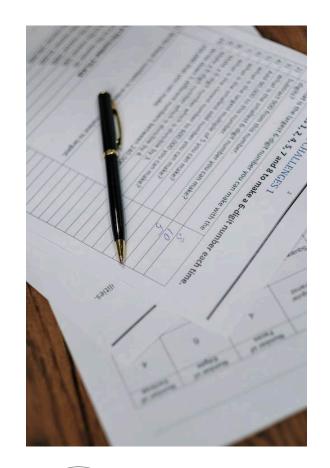
Applications submitted via SurveyMonkey and email





Review Methodology

- Incomplete proposals were removed
- Complete proposals were reviewed by Bronner staff
- 21 proposals were determined to be ineligible because:
 - The proposal was not eligible based on Treasury Final Rule
 - The proposal was not eligible based on OMB Uniform Guidance
 - The proposal was not eligible based on Lake County guidelines
- 79 proposals were scored by Bronner, using a rubric

Evaluation Methodology

- Proposals were scored Bronner staff
- Reviewers also noted whether proposals:
 - Provided sufficient supporting documentation
 - Included activities that would require additional reporting
 - Required revisions that may reduce Lake County's risk profile
 - Included sufficient detail to verify compliance
- BRONNER staff evaluated proposal scores and evaluations





Proposal Overview

• For the sake of clarity, projects have been organized as capital projects, public health service projects, and negative economic impact projects

Discussion on Guiding Principles

- Ensure that programs are complementary of and do not negatively impact County-provided services
- Organization/prioritization of proposals into different categories
 - 15% Public Health Services, 15% Negative Economic Impact, 70% Capital Projects
- Budget cap
 - Previously used "soft \$10M"
 - Originally recommended \$20M







Next Steps

- 1. Using guiding principles, identify list of priority proposals
- 2. Collaboration with identified proposing organizations to confirm details identified in review.
 - Inform applicants of the obligations, requirements, and restrictions associated with ARPA funding
 - Adjust scoring if necessary, based on any new information
- 3. Determine formal recommended selection of proposals and bring back to Committee for appropriation, to include program administration costs
