The imposition of this fee cost counties and municipalities millions of dollars in lost revenues, jeopardizing the delivery of local services. It has been widely reported that revenues collected from the 2% fee have generated the state over \$10 million more than projected. The County seeks sponsorship or support of legislation that either eliminates or reduces this fee to 1% and return needed revenues back to our communities.
