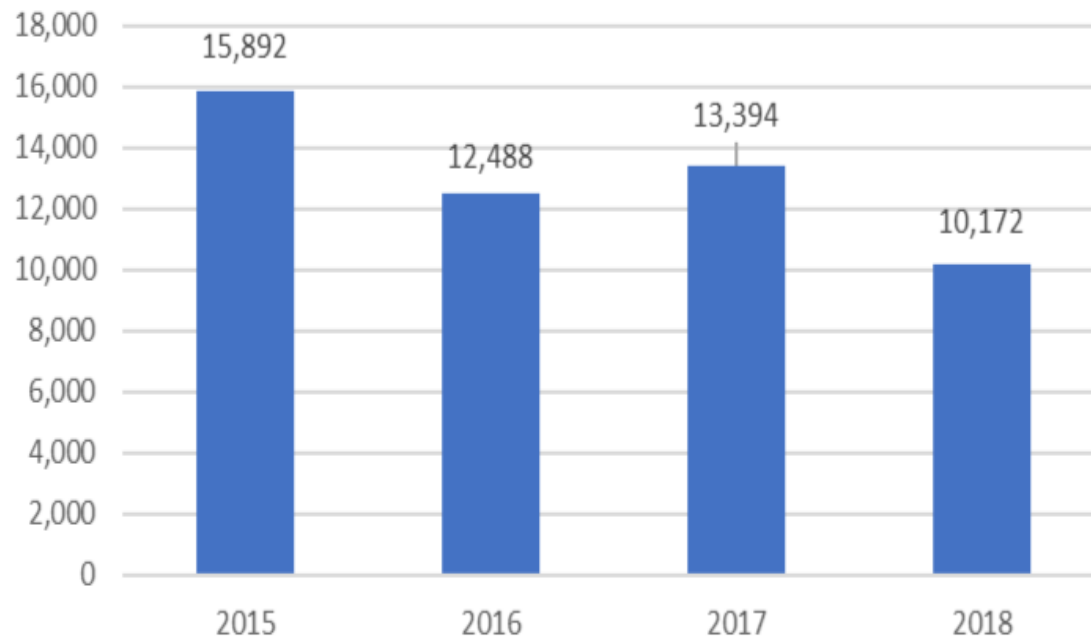

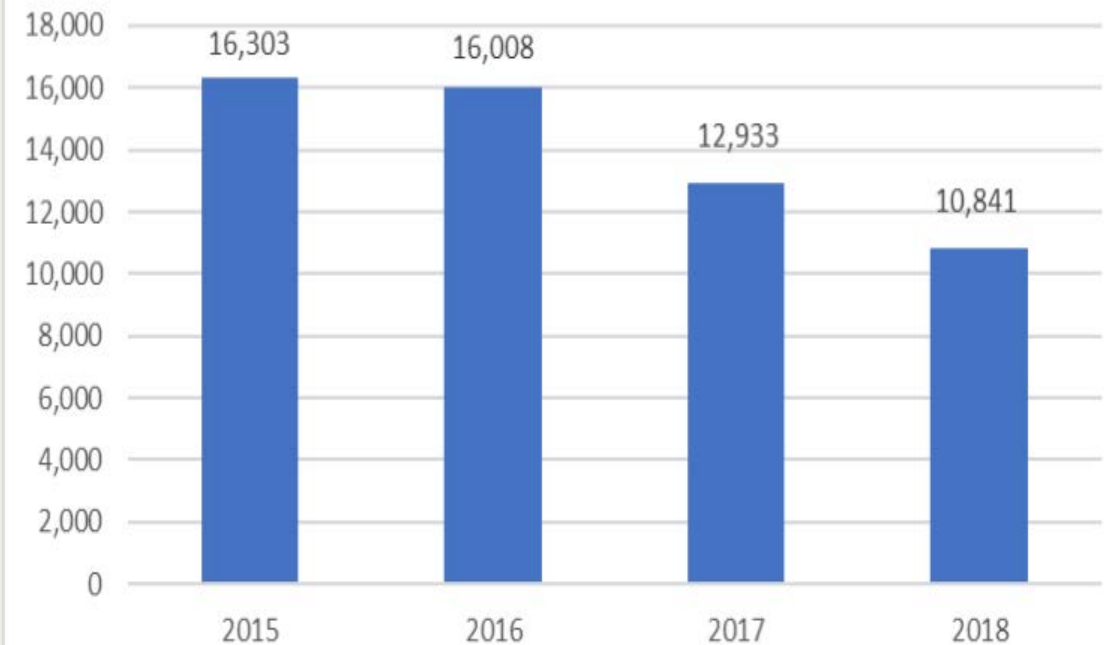

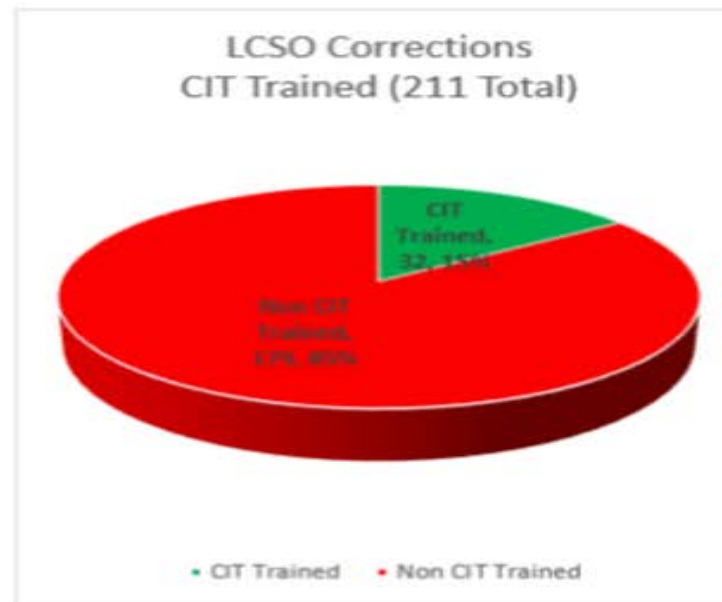
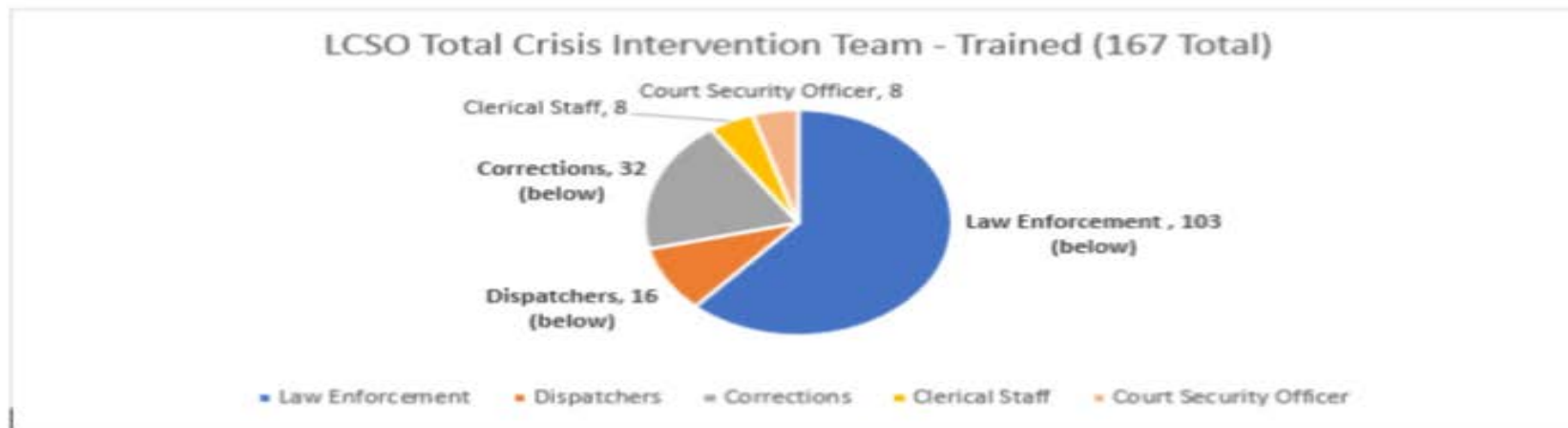
2018 Highway Patrol Statistics

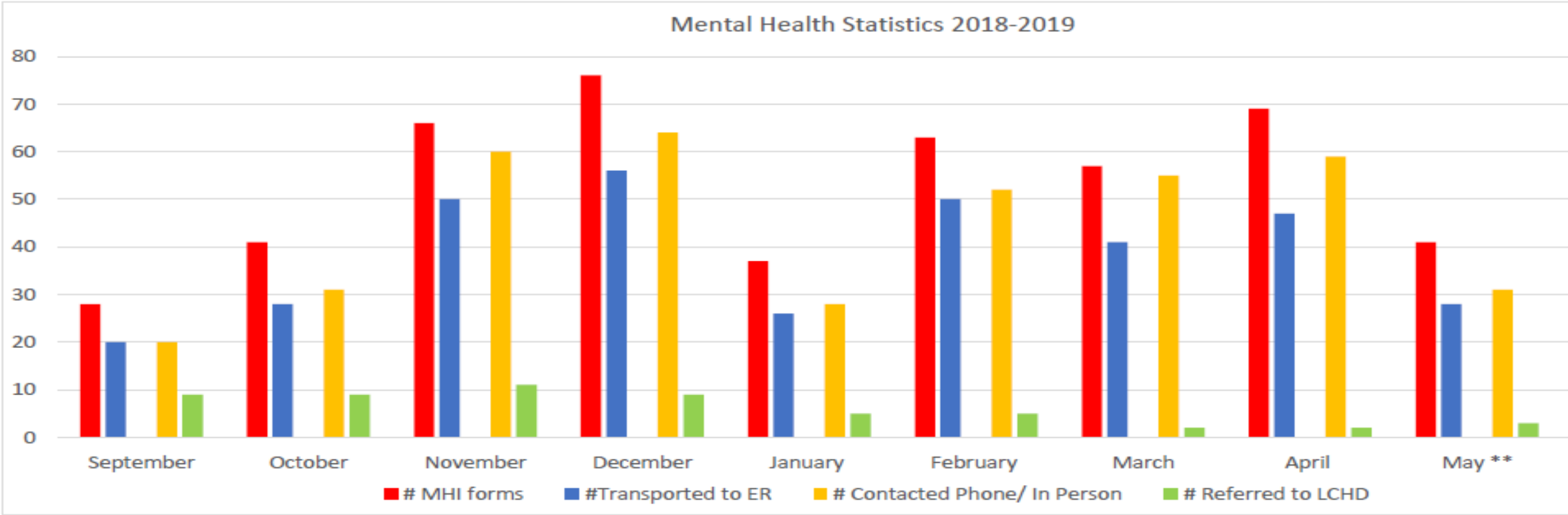

Workspace

■ Libertyville

- Space is not functional for 2019 policing needs

- Lack of office space to match the needs of the Sheriff's Office
 - Civilian employees housed in Corrections
 - Business Office housed in the basement of the county building
 - Closets turned into makeshift offices
 - There is no adequate meeting space for the many functions of the LCSO
- Security
 - Upgrades needed to include controlled access

- Ensuring robust inmate and re-entry programming to reduce recidivism

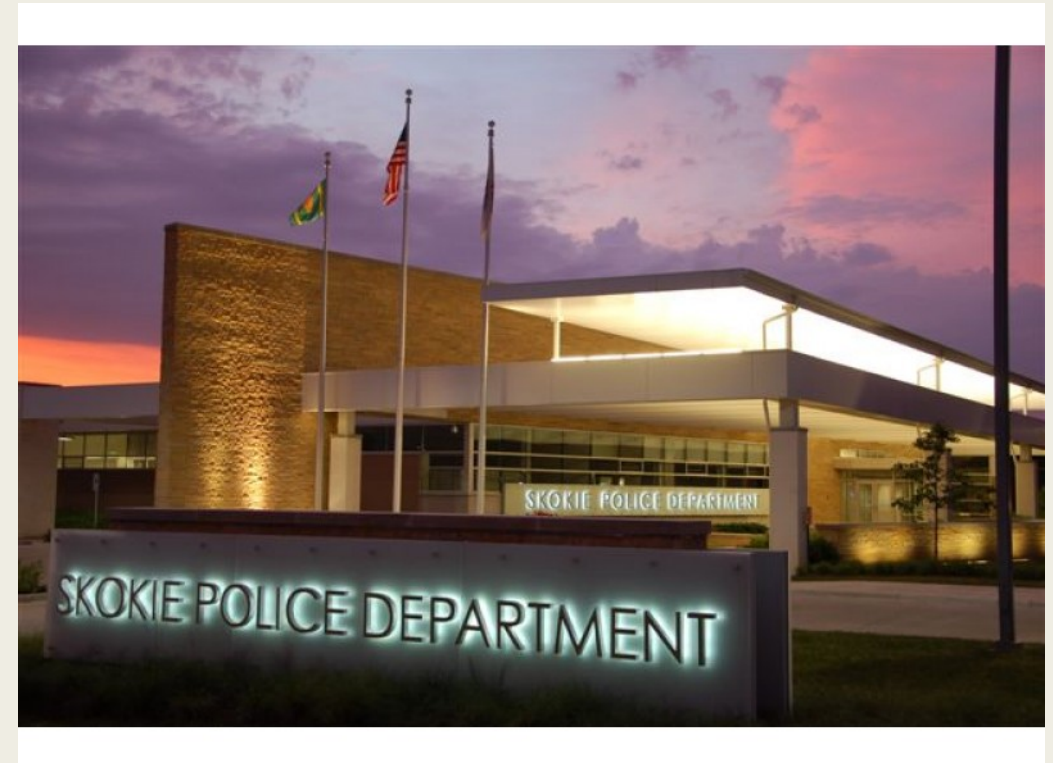
Public Safety Facility

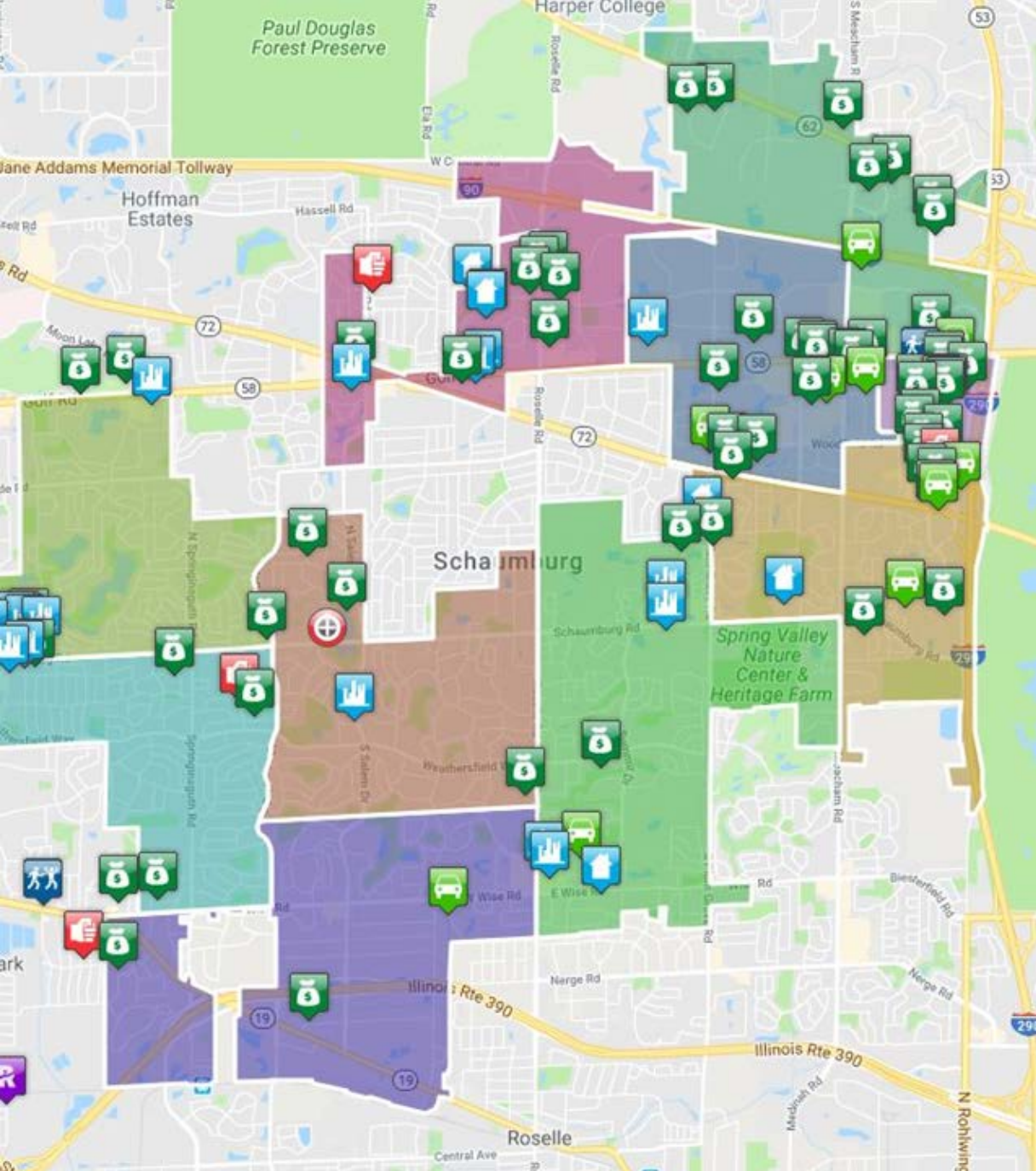

<input type="radio"/>	Bicycle Registration Form	Registration of bicycles.	Registration of bicycles.
<input type="radio"/>	Burglary from Vehicle	When property is taken without your permission from a motor vehicle. In order to report online the total value taken must be less than \$300 and there must not be forced entry to the vehicle.	Your purse, sunglasses or cell phone are taken from your car.
<input type="radio"/>	Burglary Supplement	Report property that was taken in a burglary. This form is meant to be attached to an existing burglary report, the initial burglary report must be completed in person.	A Niles Police Officer responded to your location and took a burglary report from you. You have a Niles Police Department case number and now have a list of property to report that was not provided during the initial report.
<input type="radio"/>	Criminal Damage to Property	A deliberate act of damaging, defacing or destroying personal or private property. Any damage that was caused by the use of fire you must call the police department to have an officer respond.	Mailbox maliciously damaged; broken windows; defacement of public or private property. Having eggs, shaving cream or toilet paper thrown at house or property etc...
<input type="radio"/>	Criminal Damage to Vehicle	A deliberate act of damaging, defacing or destroying a motorized vehicle.	"Keying" a car's paint finish; a car's window is broken; a vehicle is "egged" or sprayed with shaving cream.
<input type="radio"/>	Criminal Defacement - Graffiti	Graffiti written on the side of a building, stop sign, dumpster, etc...	Graffiti written on the side of a building, stop sign, dumpster, etc...
<input type="radio"/>	Identity Theft	The taking and use of someone else's personal identification information to obtain credit,	Unknown person obtains a credit card or some other goods or service by use of your personal information (such as: name, Social Security number, date of birth, etc.)

Inmate and Re-Entry Programming

Goals:

- Reduce jail population by 10% over two years as part of the MacArthur Foundation Safety and Justice Challenge
- Increase programming options for inmates
- Strengthen social service providers to provide a "warm hand-off" after release
- Streamlining programming contracts to ensure compliance





- Culinary certification program pilot graduated 10 inmates
- Community Partnership: A restaurant is willing to give them a job upon release
