 - Amends Clean Jobs Workforce Hubs Act
 - Amends Clean Energy Entrepreneurship Act
 - Creates Community Energy and Climate Planning Act
 - Creates Clean Energy Empowerment Zones Act

Four Goals of CEJA

- 1. Illinois becoming 100% renewable energy by 2050
- Illinois having a carbon free power sector by 2030
- Creating jobs that promote equity and economic development in communities left behind by this transition
- 4. Eliminating pollution through Electric Vehicle (EV) initiatives

Clean Jobs Workforce Hubs

- Creates a network of organizations providing support for disadvantaged/environmental justice communities, displaced fossil fuel workers, etc. to enter clean energy jobs
- Provides training, apprenticeship, job readiness, and skill development opportunities
- Partners with labor organizations to ensure participants of Hubs are recruited, placed, and supported in clean energy training programs

Clean Energy Entrepreneurship

- Provides support for disadvantaged businesses and contractors and allocate resources for businesses to execute clean energy
- Provides low cost capital for businesses and contractors to be able to compete with more established businesses in the clean energy sector

Community Energy and Climate Planning

- Encourages local units of government to establish plans to develop a comprehensive approach to energy and climate programs and funding resources. Among other things, plans should focus on:
 - Expanding workforce development/ job training opportunities in clean energy
 - Ensuring cost-effective transition away from fossil fuels in transport sector
 - Improving health of communities by reducing emissions, addressing brownfields, and promoting alternative energy sources

Clean Energy Empowerment Zones

- Ensuring a just transition by providing support for communities and workers impacted by closures or reduced use of coal by establishing funds for support
- Allocating state economic development resources for new business tax incentives, training, site clean-up and reuse, and tax revenue replacement
